GENERAL NEWS.

Mrs. Sarah J. Lippincott, ("Grace Greenwood") is dead at Rochelle, N. Y., aged 78. A son was born April 23 at Washington, D. C. to William Randolph Hearst and wife. Robbers held up a Russian express train on the Trans-Caucasian line, and secured \$36,000. Robbers blew a bank at Iowa, Wis., and escaped with \$1,200, overlooking \$9,000 in their haste. Robert S. Greenough, the American sculptor, is dead of the grip, at Rome, aged 55 years. Seven thousand cotton mill operatives in Rhode Island, are working on short time schedules. Twenty-five thousand cotton mill operatives in Massachusetts, have been put on short time to restrict production. D. C. Copley is temporarily at the head of the Western Federation of Miners, while President Moyer and Secretary Haywood are imprisoned. The general government is taking steps to more thoroughly enforce the laws for the protection of game and trees in national parks, and also the regulations for forest reserves. Brazil and Peru are fussing over a boundary line. Brazil is peculiarly subject to such disagreements with her neighbors as she partially bounds the territory of every government in South America except Chile. Salvatore Farino was caught in a shaft in New York City and whirled with great force many times, but his clothing was stout and clung to the shaft when the engines were stopped. Farino was dead, but not a bone was broken, although every joint in his body was dislocated.

NORTHWEST NEWS

The formal transfer of the Baker City Herald from the White Swan Mining Company to Hill and Livermore, its purchasers, was made on Saturday. Joseph Cass, of Vancouver, B. C., left a letter stating that he would commit suicide by jumping in the bay Sunday. The bay will be dragged in search of the body. Winnie Farr, a 15-year-old girl of Palouse City, died Saturday night on the operating table at Walla Walla hospital. She did not recover from the effect of the anesthetic. John Dunham, a switchman, was awarded \$20,000 damages from the Southern Pacific at Roseburg, Saturday, for the loss of a leg under a yard engine. The accident was caused by a broken hand rod on the engine. The Central Labor Union of Astoria has authorized the strike of the Loughshoremen's Union to extend to all other trades if the strike on the steamer Elmore and the Columbia Packers' Association is not settled at once. The socialist candidate for supreme judge of Oregon is not eligible to the position because of the statute providing that supreme judges must have been admitted to practice in the supreme court of the state at time of election. John J. McLeod, city bridge inspector of Portland, was run down and his leg crushed by a freight car in the Portland terminal yards, Saturday night. He lay in the yards from 11 p. m. until 6 a. m., before he was able to attract help.

SOCIALISTS MEET

NOMINATED TWO CANDIDATES FOR LEGISLATURE.

Decide Not to Put Out Full County Ticket—Dr. M. V. Turley of Weston, and F. A. Sikes of Milton, Named—Adopt State Platform.

Sixty-five delegates of the socialist party of Umatilla county assembled on Saturday afternoon at Millarkey hall, in this city, in county convention.

Nearly every precinct in the county was represented at the convention, and the work of the convention was performed in a manner that indicated well-founded hope of success. Temporary organization was effected by electing George Robbins of this city, as temporary chairman, and M. H. Rice of Freeewater, as temporary secretary. The following committees were appointed:

On permanent organization—W. S. Badley, J. E. Lucas, W. L. Geurant and Peter Baker.

On credentials—Virgil Moore, George Hamble, A. B. High, F. L. McRae and Smith.

On platform—W. C. Burgess, Geo. Warburton, J. M. Bryson, A. B. Hanna and Earl D. Williams.

The committee on permanent organization recommended that the temporary organization be made permanent, and the committee on credentials recommended the seating of the 65 delegates present.

The matter of nominating a full county ticket was then warmly discussed and was ably defended and opposed. After mature deliberation it was decided to center the strength of the party on a legislative ticket, and not nominate for any other county offices.

The following four prominent socialists were then placed in nomination: George Robbins, Dr. M. V. Turley, F. A. Sikes and J. B. Despain.

The first ballot resulted in the selection of Dr. M. V. Turley of Weston, and F. A. Sikes of Milton, for representatives.

The committee on platform then reported the state socialist platform, which was unanimously adopted as the platform of Umatilla county socialists.

The members of the party hope to make a good showing in the county this year, and the comparative strength of that party and the republican in this county is shown in the fact that there were but 110 delegates to the republican convention and 65 in the socialist convention.

Committeemen for the different precincts were named as follows: Holdman, George Warburton; Gilliland, George Green; Meacham, Hermann Barber; Milton, M. H. Rice; Weston, Dr. M. V. Turley; Echo, O. D. Teel; Vinson, H. Schwartz; Pilot Rock, Charles Simmons; McKay, Peter Baker.

The Oregon state platform, which was unanimously adopted, is as follows:

Platform Adopted. The committee on platform recommended the state platform which was adopted as follows:

We the socialist party of Umatilla county, Oregon, in convention assembled, proclaim our allegiance to the socialist party of America and affirm our unflinching adherence to the principles and the program of international revolutionary socialism.

First—Labor produces all wealth. Second—Under the present economic and political conditions labor's share in the wealth which it creates is merely a mean and uncertain subsistence.

Third—So long as the present organization of industry remains, the capitalist class will monopolize the machines of production and will appropriate, through the wage system, the wealth created by the working class.

Fourth—This appropriation of labor's wealth by the capitalists is so complete that it enables them to live in luxury and idleness.

Fifth—As a necessary consequence of this exploitation of the laborers by the capitalists—this appropriation of all property out of the hands of the toilers into the private ownership of the holders of capital, there is an inevitable war between the interests of the working class on the one hand, and the interests of the capitalist class on the other.

Sixth—This class struggle between the wealth makers and the wealth takers will endure so long as our present system of production for profit continues.

Seventh—In this conflict between the workers and the capitalists, labor is disarmed on the economic side, all the instruments of production and distributing wealth being owned and controlled by holders of capital.

Eighth—There is only one weapon with which the working class can successfully oppose the capitalist class—and that is the ballot.

Ninth—This fact demands as an inevitable conclusion the organization of the working class into a political party that shall be everywhere and always, distinct from and founded entirely upon the interests of the working class. The socialist party is organizing to meet this demand, and is, therefore, the party of the working class.

Tenth—The socialist party, when in office, shall always and everywhere until the present system of wage-

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
