GENERAL NEWS.

The New York Central railway shops at Albany, N. Y., have been burned.

John Brown, aged 81 years, a veteran of the Mexican war, is dead at Harrison, Idaho.

The greater part of the town of Brainard, Minn., has been wiped out by fire. Loss, \$150,000.

The baseball season, the entire country over, opens duller than during any springtime in 30 years.

Owen Wister, the novelist, can hardly survive the operation for appendicitis which was performed upon him lately in Philadelphia.

Two firemen were buried beneath falling walls and killed, April 27, at a fire which destroyed the Standley soap works in New York City.

Kahokia, Ill., is entirely under water and deserted. Many thousand acres of rich farming land are flooded and rendered useless for this year.

The flooding of South Africa with Chinese and other cheap labor at the behest of capitalists, threatens to provoke a bitter industrial labor war.

There is no apparent prospect for an agreement between coal miners and operators of Western Kentucky, and a strike of 4,000 men on May 15, is probable.

April 26 all business in the town of Oak Park, a suburb of Chicago, was suspended for 15 hours because of the contagious excitement centering in a revival.

William K. Vanderbilt, Jr., is said to have a serious heart trouble, developed by too much automobilizing, racing and other speedy excitements, and must knock off and lead a quiet life.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

A rate war is expected on the Columbia river between The Dalles and Portland, since the steamer Spencer has been put back on the run.

Sherman county farmers sent 1,000 hogs to the Portland markets last week. Hog raising is one of the principal industries in that county.

Surveys on the Lewiston-Clearwater electric railroad are now complete. The road will be 110 miles in length, with a branch line to Nez Perce City, 25 miles long.

Tom Robertson, of The Dalles, was accidentally shot and killed in a sheep camp on John Day river, Wednesday, by Dorris Trent, another boy who was playing with a loaded gun.

The Des Chutes Irrigation Company has been called down by the state land board for advertising misleading conditions concerning the land the company is reclaiming under the Carey act, in Crook county.

The trial of Captain Williams, of the state militia at Eugene, for striking a private with his saber, has been concluded and the case is now being reviewed by the governor, after which the result will be announced.

A contest is on at Newport over the attempted purchase by the city of a large body of tide lands in the city limits. Property owners claim the land is not tide land and that the city has no right to monopolize it under that law.

Bruce Borders, whose shoulder blade was broken by an accident on the La Grande school ground, is in a precarious condition and his mother refuses to allow a doctor to examine his injuries, saying the Lord will look out for the boy.

A FAVORABLE WEEK

FRUIT, GRAIN AND GRASS IN EXCELLENT CONDITION.

Oregon Weather is Conducive to Rapid Growth Since Actual Spring Season Opened—Stock Gaining in Flesh—Sheepshearing Now in Progress—Range Never Was Better.

The weather during the week has not been wholly favorable for advancing the growth of crops; it has been cool and rainy, with one heavy frost in the western section of the state and two or three light frosts in exposed places east of the Cascades.

Fruit, which generally is in full bloom, has received some injury, but just how much cannot now be ascertained. In the western section the weather immediately following the frost was foggy and cool, which is favorable for the recuperation of chilled plant life, and it is not thought that the fruit crop has been seriously injured.

Fall wheat continues doing splendidly; it has a good color, is well stood and growing rapidly. The soil is in excellent condition for spring plowing and this work is being pushed; seeding, however, has been delayed to some extent by the rains, but it is now generally well advanced, and the early sown fields of wheat, barley and oats are germinating nicely.

Hops also are thrifty and promising, but the work of cultivating the vines is much behindhand. Pasture is excellent for the season of the year. Stock is picking up in flesh and the flow of milk in the dairy districts is better than usual. Goat shearing is finished and sheep shearing is becoming general.

Columbia River Valley.

Sinnasho, Wasco county, J. O. Ashenurst—Weather good; spring sowing is up in places; some soils are still too wet to plow; fruit trees beginning to bloom.

Grass Valley, Sherman county, G. B. Bourhill—Weather continues favorable for growing crops; farmers have nearly completed their spring seeding and some are plowing for summer fallow; fall sown wheat making rapid growth.

Ione, Morrow county, P. G. Balsiger—Week mild, with occasional rain; two heavy windstorms occurred; wheat and grass are growing finely; stock is picking up; fruit trees have not been damaged as yet.

Pendleton, Umatilla county, H. J. Taylor—Ground in good condition for plowing; wheat doing finely; it is getting too rank and in danger of being injured by frost when jointing; potato planting begun; fruit doing well; grass good.

Baker County Also Needs Roads.

L. E. Tourman, a prosperous rancher on Upper Burnt river, whose farm is about four miles above Herford, was in Baker City yesterday accompanied by his son. He reports the roads between Baker City and the summit of the Burnt river divide as almost impassible. Loose rock fills the road at many places and washouts are numerous. On the Burnt river side of the summit, conditions are better, as the road supervisor has kept the highway in good repair throughout the winter.

From Baker City to the summit, the distance is 20 miles. The road taxes allotted to that district amounts to about \$800 per year, and from all available sources it is learned that an average of about \$30 a year is expended upon the road in the way of repairs and improvements.—Baker City Herald.
