## STRONG BASEBALL

COMPLETE LINE-UP FOR TWO STRONG TEAMS.

Wonders Have Been Almost Completely Reorganized, and Very Much Improved - Ex-Catcher at Carlisle University Will Catch - A Policeman Will Attend Next Sunday's Game and Enforce Order if Need Be.

The Wonders has been reorganized to a certain extent since the game of last Sunday at Weston, and can now put up a better game than ever before. Changes have been made in the captaincy and management and some new material has been added. Lee Drake has been elected to the dual position of captain and manager, and will direct both its schedule and its field work during the remainder of the season. He is now in communication with several outside teams and will have a schedule in a short time that will ensure Pendleton as good ball as has been seen in the city for the past two years, at least. He has on his list some good men who will play, and hopes to be able to further strengthen the team as the season advances.

From now on Henry Chalwin will be with the team, and will wear the mask for the nine. Chalwin is an Indian, and was catcher for the Carlisle team last year. He is a strong batter, a heady player and a good base runner. He will make one of the strongest men on the team, and will put up some good ball. He will be with the team for the first time in the game of next Sunday.

Fred Lioallen, of Adams, will pitch for the Wonders the rest of the season if present plans are carried out. Mr. Lioallen is expecting to be connected with the hospital as a medical student, and if he does he will toe the slab for his summer's exercise.

It is expected that one or two other men will be put on the list during the next few days, or weeks at the longest.

Mr. Drake will have a special policeman at the grounds Sunday, and will see that there is good order. The game will be called at 3 o'clock.

The opposing team is composed of some very good players, some of them having played professional ball. The aggregation has been selected from the best players that could be gathered together from over the county, and the game promises to be an interesting, close and exciting one.
