**Frost Kills the Prunes.**  
C. M. Smith of Jefferson, is in the city today. Mr. Smith reports serious damage to the prune crop in the upper part of the county by the frost of last night. He says the fine orchard of E. N. Thomas is practically ruined for this year and other growers are of the opinion that every tree on low ground will not bear a pound of fruit. The Thomas fruit farm is one of the largest in the south end of Marion county and comprises about 40 acres of fine prune trees. A large crop was picked last year and the prospects 10 days ago were for another heavy yield. The frost, however, caused the bloom to drop and there is scarcely a live bud on the trees. The orchard is located on low land and it is thought that the hill farms are not affected as severely, if at all, because the frost did not appear to be as heavy on high ground.—Salem Journal.

**Best Year in Ten.**  
George Chandler has given out an opinion on the prospects for this season, through the columns of the Baker City Democrat in which he says some hopeful things. As the comments apply here as well as at Baker, the substance of the talk is reproduced.

The main statement made by Mr. Chandler is that this season now coming on promises the richest returns to the stockmen and farmers of any in 10 years. The damp weather has made the grass grow luxuriantly and it is safe to say there will be the biggest crop of hay and grain raised in many years.

Cattle and sheep came through the winter in fairly good shape and the early pasture and promise of a long range means a large production of extraordinary fine quality of stock, which cannot fail to bring as high a price as the market affords.

**Higher Criticism**  
BIBLE LEAGUE MOVES TO COUNTERACT ITS GROWTH

Will inaugurate an Aggressive Fight to Maintain the Integrity of the Most Strict Orthodox Construction of the Scriptures—Claim That the Ultimate of Higher Criticism is to Expunge the Gospels.

New York, May 2.—Alarmed by the growing aggressiveness of the "higher criticism" movement, which is described as "assaults upon the Bible as the inspired Word of God," the recently formed American Bible League began a three days' conference in the Marjie Collegiate church today, the announced purpose of which is to concentrate popular attention upon the mastery of the Bible and what is in it.

The convention will undertake to describe the present assault on the Bible and its claims, and to show that it is causing demoralization in conduct and education, and having a bad influence on the ministry and on missions. It will undertake to show that the present claims of higher critics contain nothing that is new, and that the real purpose of these critics is not to clear certain disputed matters in the Old Testament story, but eventually to attack and throw out the gospels.

The convention is noteworthy because of the prominence of the participants. William Phillips Hall, president of the league, is the presiding officer. Among the speakers will be President Francis L. Patton of Princeton Theological Seminary, Professor Howard Osgood of Rochester Theological Seminary, the Rev. Dr. Wayland Hoyt of Philadelphia, and Willis E. Lougee of the International Young Men's Christian Association.

**GILLESPIE MURDER TRIAL.**  
Man Accused of the Murder of His Twin Sister.

Rising Sun, Ind., May 2.—The term of the district court which convened here today will be made notable by the trial of James Gillespie, the well-to-do and prominent citizen who is charged with the murder of his twin sister, Miss Elizabeth Gillespie. The crime attracted widespread attention and the trial will be followed with close attention throughout this section of the country.

On the night of December 8 last, Miss Gillespie was arranging chairs in her home for the reception of a literary club, to which she belonged, when she was shot dead through a window. After days of investigating, the grand jury indicted James Gillespie, the twin brother of the murdered woman; Myron L. Barbour, his wife Carrie, and Mrs. Belle Seward, all close relatives of Miss Gillespie. It is the supposition that James Gillespie fired the fatal shot as a result of a conspiracy to obtain the property of his sister.

Captain Charles Young, colored, of the Ninth Cavalry, has been made military attaché to Haiti and San Domingo. He is a graduate of West Point and has an excellent record, both as to ability and character.
