SPEAKS FOR WOODCRAFT

MRS. C. C. VAN ORSDALL'S ADDRESS AT OAKLAND.

Grand Guardian Delivers An Interesting Heart to Heart Talk to Joint Convention of Alameda County Circles at Oakland--Tells of the Wonderful Growth of the Order in Seven Years.

Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdall, grand guardian of the order of the Women of Woodcraft, delivered an able address before the Alameda county circles last week, on the growth of the order, from which the following extracts are taken. She said in part: "The story of all great achievements is a story of small beginnings, of unwavering faith, of sleepless persistency. Nothing in all the world's history ever sprang into life spontaneously perfect. No following was ever gathered about any movement or idea without the lodestone of faith to draw men and women to it--a faith which would enable them to live for it, and if need be die for it.

"The story of the Women of Woodcraft contains these elements. In April, 1897, when our order was organized by the seven men and women who were called by circumstances to this task there was no outward and visible sign of the stature it would attain the results it would record, the splendid development it would be granted in seven short years.

"Its beginning was essentially small, commonplace, humble. But there was faith and there was granted the gift of persistency--the persistency which crawled when it could not walk, walked when it could not run, picked itself up when it stumbled, never knew when it was whipped, moved always a step at a time and each step forward.

"The results today are worth looking at, not to gather lazy or conceited content therefrom, but to quicken our ambition and fire our enthusiasm in the great work before us--for we have only begun to grow, only touched the outskirts of the work we are destined to do for the order, and through the order for the homes of the West, this great West of ours, which is surely, if there is such a place, God's own peculiar country.

"In seven years, starting with no assets but faith and persistency, we have paid death claims to a grand total of \$764,755--almost \$1,000,000. We have accumulated surplus assets above this enormous distribution of \$236,000, of which \$190,000 is invested in interest-bearing bonds. We have gathered a membership of 42,000 in 582 communities of the nine Pacific states.

"From an unknown and unrecognized little organization with no rating in the financial world we have reached a point where our warrants in any of the towns in Oregon, Colorado, Washington or California can be cashed at any bank with no more hesitation than if they were bank drafts.

"These results are not to be placed to the credit of any one man or woman, or any set of men or women. Every member of the order, with a devotion and enthusiasm which is peculiar in the history of fraternal orders, has helped, has contributed his or her share of effort and of loyalty. We have always had in a remarkable degree a 'working membership.' This trait we must each studiously cultivate, as individuals, as local circles and in the Grand Circle.

"This gathering tonight is a gathering of the representative workers; and as I have an especial fondness for those who do things--those upon whom falls the 'work of the world,' I am proud of the honor of being one of you.

"California ranks third in membership among the nine states, with Colorado first and Oregon second. You have over 7,000 members in the state now. You have the population; you have the energy and ambition; you have a 'good thing' to talk for and recommend to those seeking fraternal insurance. It's up to California to rank second--even first. Will you grasp your opportunity? I have faith to believe you will.

Domesticated Elk.

Probably the only domesticated herd of elk in the Inland Empire browses on the ranch of William P. Reser, democratic state senator from this county, two and a half miles southeast of town, says a Walla Walla dispatch. There are 14 animals in the bunch, all sufficiently tame to allow strangers to come within 50 yards of them.

This is horn shedding time among the bull elk, and when The Spokesman-Review correspondent visited the field recently, a fine pair of horns, shed a short time before by a stately looking animal, were lying in the grass. The two horns had been dropped about 100 yards apart and were undamaged. It is said the elk nibble the castoff product until they are destroyed, if left any length of time. One big beast still wore a tall pair of antlers and stood on the hillside like a sentinel, ready to give warning if too near an approach was made.

Mr. Reser has had an elk herd for 23 years. He obtained the first animals from Oregon. An elk lives about as long as a cow, and its mode of living is about the same. Senator Reser keeps the herd in a pasture behind his barns, where there is plenty of water and a fair sized range.
