GENERAL NEWS.

Russia lately borrowed \$100,000,000 for three years, which is to draw 5 per cent interest.

Drew College, a pioneer educational institution for women, at Carmel, N. Y., was destroyed by fire. Loss, \$100,000, with not over \$25,000 insurance.

H. S. Ringi was drowned near Chicago by his automobile overturning into a ditch. He was thrown beneath it and his head held beneath the water.

Brazilian troops are being mobilized along the Peruvian frontier upon the presumption that Peru will undertake to hold by force the disputed territory.

Five-year-old Sarah Greenberg fell five stories sheer out of the window of an apartment house in New York. She struck on her back and was not seriously hurt.

James C. Cook is dead at Milford, Mass., aged 87. He had been a practical printer 72 years, and was well known to all the craft in the Eastern and Northeastern states.

A switch engine fell 30 feet through a trestle into South Tejon street, Denver. Four men were more or less seriously injured. The trestle had been weakened by floods.

A copy of Gibbons' "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire," London, 1783, from George Washington's private library, and bearing his signature, recently sold for \$1,626.

The 3-year-old child of Charles Snow, of Torrington, Conn., fell upon his baby sister, 11 months old, and beat her with a stick until she will die as the effect. The child was inspired solely by jealousy because his grandmother bestowed more attention upon the babe than upon himself.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Masked robbers held up and robbed A. B. Rosenberg, a wealthy Hebrew, at Seattle, Tuesday night, securing \$375.

Indian Agent A. M. Anderson, of the Fort Colville reservation, has been removed by the president, on account of charges of irregularity.

Charles Paulson, a tramp logger, who with a gang of toughs has been infesting the neighborhood near Colfax, was killed by officers Tuesday while resisting arrest.

The Dalles City, a Columbia river boat, won in a race from The Dalles to Portland, over the Spencer, by 33 minutes, Monday. The time in which the Dalles City made the run was six hours and 33 minutes.

Orto Kulper, of Portland, who has just returned from Alaska, says there are hundreds of men idle in the Koyuk coal and oil fields of Alaska, and that they would gladly return to the United States if they could.

Japanese steamship companies operating between San Francisco and the Orient, have discontinued all their transportation lines until the close of the Russo-Japanese war. Insurance rates were so high as to be prohibitive.

Louis H. Wilkie, of Seattle, an aged German owning considerable property, paid up all his obligations Tuesday, and then swallowed carbolic acid, dying almost instantly. He said he was a burden to his family and had threatened to suicide, several times.

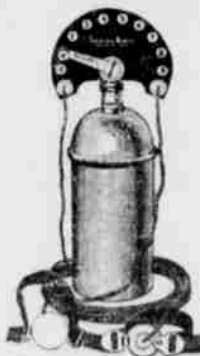
