GENERAL NEWS.

Twelve horses ran at the Chester, England, handicap, May 4. It was won—\$12,750—by Sand Boy.

The threatened street car strike in San Francisco, has been averted by a compromise. Mayor Schmitz was the principal mediator.

Four bandits were recently garroted at Santiago de Cuba. These were the first executions by this method since the Spanish occupation.

Two labor union men and one policeman were killed, and about 100 union men wounded in labor riots May 1, at Buenos Ayers, Argentina.

A 40-year boundary squabble between Chile and Argentina has just been settled by a hard and fast agreement to the result of a joint survey.

The Canadian government has entered actively upon a policy of colonizing British North America just as far northward as people can be induced to locate.

Lowell Ellis was convicted at Canyon City, Col., of train wrecking. His companions, Myron Aldrich, and William Denton, were acquitted. All are under 18 years of age.

The Tibetans give every indication that they will put up a determined fight against further British aggressions from the south. They have the latter stalled now in the vicinity of Lhasa, with fortifications and troops.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

C. M. Idelman, of Portland, is talked of for governor of Alaska.

All the lodges in Albany are organizing fraternal baseball teams to play during the summer months.

Master builders on the Lewis and Clark fair grounds have asked for an eight-hour day on the fair ground work.

Eugene may have street autos instead of street cars, a company now having an automobile line under consideration.

James Reid, a pioneer of Cariboo, and a member of the Canadian parliament since 1881, is dead at Vancouver, B. C.

Tom McFadden, of Portland, attempted suicide Wednesday morning because a chambermaid in a front street hotel killed him.

Because of the accidental deaths of two young sons within a week, Mrs. Samuel E. Coulter, of Vancouver, B. C., has lost her reason.

Mayor Hallinger closed every pool room in Seattle, Wednesday morning, and will make a closed town of it if he is compelled to double the police force to do it.

A locomotive and 14 cars loaded with logs, ran away on the Black Hills logging camp road, near Olympia, Wednesday, smashing the entire train into splinters.

The body of an unknown man weighing about 165 pounds, five feet and eight inches in height, wearing an oilskin coat, was washed ashore near Astoria, on the Columbia, Wednesday morning.

Deputy Sheriff Miller, of Silver Bow, Mont., jumped out of a car window on a moving Southern Pacific train, in Nevada, Wednesday morning, to follow a prisoner who was making his escape from Miller, and neither prisoner nor deputy can be found. It is feared both fell into the river which ran beside the track. The train was backed up, but found no trace of them.

DODGING THE LAW.

Indians Trying to Evade Law Requiring Dipping.

Wallula, Wash., May 5.—Several hundred Umatilla Indian cayuses are reported ranging on the south slope of the Horse Heaven, having been driven over from Morrow county by their Indian owners to save the consequences of failure to properly dip before May 1. Six hundred of the animals, nearly all affected with mange, were wintering on the northern Morrow range near the Columbia when State Veterinarian Christie made an investigation six weeks ago. He ordered a few of the ponies shot as a warning, and gave the Umatillas until May 1 to have their cayuses dipped. Otherwise, all were to be killed. The Indians were promised assistance in the dipping.

Instead of carrying out the order, the redmen hurried the major portion of their hands over into Klickitat county, crossing the Columbia somewhere between Umatilla and Castle Rock. Horse Heaven homesteaders are reported indignant at the unwelcome infection thus brought among their stock, and complaint has been sent to the state veterinarian of Washington. What action will be taken is not known.

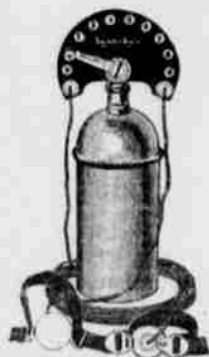
