CONCENTRATE MILK

BOISE CITY WOMAN HAS NEW FOODSTUFF.

Invented Milk in a Powder Form That is More Healthful Than Real Article—All Possibility of Germs is Removed by the Process—Mortality Among Babies Will Be Reduced by Its Use.

The following interesting story, concerning a woman who for a time resided in Boise, comes from Paris, says the Boise Statesman:

Beautiful Mrs. Joseph R. De la Mar, the most strikingly handsome woman in the American colony in Paris, who was recently married to James H. Hatmaker of New York, has originated a most interesting and curious fad. At her teas this winter Mrs. Hatmaker has astonished her guests with this odd question:

"If not a cup of tea, may I make you a glass of milk?"

And then from a little jeweled silver box, with a very small gold spoon, the hostess drops a little yellowish-white powder into a glass of water and serves her wondering guest with a refreshing drink of milk.

The first taste of the magic beverage removes the not unreasonable misgivings of the guest, and the question, "How on earth do you make a glass of milk with that powder?" is answered by Mrs. Hatmaker thus:

"To tell you the truth, this miraculous powder is the secret of my romance with Mr. Hatmaker. He invented a way to reduce milk to a powder, and, do you know, it's the greatest thing anybody has ever discovered."

"All the horrid little germs that kill babies and make people ill are driven out, you know. I just couldn't help falling in love with a man who was so clever."

"Being sterile and dry it will, of course, keep indefinitely, provided that no germs are allowed access to it. Samples, properly packed in airtight boxes, have been sent round the world, and have been found to be perfectly sterile—germ-free—on their return."

"Most reassuring of all is the declaration—said to be supported by experiments in more than a thousand cases—that this powdered form of sterilized milk solves the problem furnished by the dreadful mortality among babies in large cities during the summer months."

"Statistics in France and England show that about one in 10 of all the deaths that occur are directly traced to the use of milk. The majority of these deaths are of children under 1 year old."

"Yet if children do not receive a liberal supply of milk during the first decade of their life they suffer in comparison with their better-fed fellows. The explanation of the paradox is only too simple."

LADIES' HOME JOURNAL SUED.

Coshocton, O., May 5.—The Coshocton Carnegie library was dedicated today with simple but interesting exercises. Professor George W. Knight of the Ohio State University, and other visitors of prominence were among the participants. The library building is built of granite and is a handsome edifice, erected at a cost of about \$17,000. In addition to the cost of the building Andrew Carnegie presented to the trustees a sum of \$2,000 with which to furnish it.

Michigan School Superintendents.

Lansing, Mich., May 5.—The annual convention of the Michigan State Association of School Superintendents and Principals began in Lansing today and will continue through tomorrow. Superintendent J. W. Simmons of Owosso is the president of the association and the presiding officer of the convention. An interesting program of papers, addresses and discussions has been arranged for the meeting.

Montana Eagles in Session.

Billings, Mont., May 5.—The rapid growth of the order of Eagles in Montana is evidenced by the large and representative attendance at the state convention which began here today. Delegates are present from all the chief cities of the state. Business and pleasure is combined in the two days' program for the gathering.
