T. BEALE, OF PILOT ROCK, HELPED FOUND THE STATE.

From Old Fort Boise to Diamond Peak His Party of 200 Wagons Made the First Trail Across the Central Oregon Desert—At Oregon City His Company Met a Hot Re-buke From Dr. McLaughlin—Oregon Reached to the Rockies in 1850.

Among the hardy pioneers who helped to found the state of Oregon, Umatilla county has a goodly share. Yesterday T. Beale, who has resided at Pilot Rock for the past 24 years, visited this office and related a few pioneer experiences which enter into the very foundation of civil government in this state.

Mr. Beale came to Oregon with the great immigration of 1850, from Southwest Missouri. He was one of a company in which there were 200 wagons, and when the company reached old Fort Boise, it started due west, through the Harney and Malheur deserts, directly toward the headwaters of the Willamette river.

They struck the Cascade range at Diamond Peak, and cut a road down the west slope of the mountains, to the present site of Corvallis. There had been no wagons over the route through Central Oregon at that time. The brush and timber were so thick on the Cascades that their progress was very slow down the little creek that formed the headwaters of the Willamette river.

They knew they were near the Willamette valley when they came to in sight of the Three Sisters in the Cascade range, for they had been told in a letter from Oregon the year before, that the three peaks were sure landmarks that stood over the beautiful valley, on the west side of the range.

Where the company started down the west side of the range, they were compelled to let the wagons down with ropes, so steep were the cliffs. They were six months from Bates county, Missouri, to Oregon City, arriving at the latter place on November 1, 1850.

Mr. Beale remembers Dr. John McLoughlin, the Hudson Bay pioneer of this state, and when the old Britisher saw the 200 wagons in Mr. Beale's party drive down the beautiful valley and begin to make camp at the old town of Oregon City, he stormed out in terrible rage, and asked the company what they were doing in British territory. Pointing eastward, he said to them: "There is your American territory, east of the Rockies. Oregon is ours and reaches to the summit of the Rockies, and we will hold it! Go back to your own country!"

Mr. Beale's party answered that they had come to Oregon to stay and that they would wade through blood up to their necks, to hold the country for the United States.

Mr. Beale was born in Virginia, on the James river in 1816, and has helped settle four frontiers in his life of 88 years. When a young man he came from Virginia to Kentucky and took part in the early settlement of that state. Then he moved to Illinois, and later to Missouri, and remembers seeing St. Louis for the first time in 1837, when it was no larger than Pendleton, and not half so well built from an architectural point of view, most of the buildings being small wooden structures.

He came up to Umatilla county from the Willamette valley in 1880, and thinks this is the best portion of Oregon.

GENERAL NEWS.

Meat has advanced 25 per cent in Moscow, Russia, as a result of the war.

The United States battleship Ohio, which is being built in San Francisco, will make her official trial trip in July.

Pope Plus has ruled that women shall not sing in Catholic church choirs and that boys shall take their places.

Kingsley's restaurant, in the busy part of Chicago, was held up by two masked men who secured \$1,000 and made their escape.

Mrs. Beale Nunzinsky, of New York City, went insane over reading health magazines. She has fasted seven days and still refuses to eat.

In a quarrel over a 30 cent jackpot in a poker game, Harry Simmons, a circus acrobat, shot and instantly killed L. B. Wickham, a Chicago waiter, Monday.

John Schurster, of Moose Lake, Canada, aged 14 years, murdered his 8-year-old sister by beating out her brains with a poker. His father is accused of having buried her to conceal the crime.

W. R. Malone and Colonel Veasey, two prominent citizens of Luling, Texas, were shot and instantly killed by S. M. Nixon, a prominent democrat. The tragedy was the outcome of an old and bitter family feud.

Henry Anderson, an employe of the Illinois Steel Works, missed his footing and fell into a tank of molten metal. He seized the top of the tank, but before assistance could reach him he dropped back and was instantly consumed.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The grand jury of Cliver Bow county, Montana, has found 21 indictments against the various county officials, including commissioners, coroner and road supervisors, for crookedness in office.

George Smith, of Seattle, has just been sentenced to six months in the Walla Walla penitentiary for chicken stealing. It is the first conviction for this crime in the history of the Washington courts.

Mrs. D. F. Wisenbacher, one of the Anna Held opera singers, has abandoned the stage and is now actually working in a place claim in Southern Oregon, which her father and brother purchased for her.

Complaint has been made to the Indian department that the representatives of the St. Louis exposition forcibly took historical totem poles from the Haidah tribe of Indians in Alaska. The poles are said to represent 400 years of history of the tribe.

Wallowa county has offered \$500 reward for the capture of the innaha postoffice robbers, who have been in hiding in the Sheep Creek breaks for the past week. They were in the custody of a sheep herder at one time, but overpowered him and escaped before the sheriff and posse arrived.

The Geiser-Hendryx Investment Company, of Sumpter, has purchased the Oregon King mine, at Ashwood, for \$400,000. The property was located by a sheep herder 20 years ago and has been in litigation most of the time since its discovery, until last June, when its ownership was settled by the courts.
