## BEET CROP IS GOOD

ECHO BEETS INDICATE HIGH SUGAR PERCENTAGE.

F. S. Bramwell, Field Superintendent, Would Employ Umatilla Indians to Work in the Fields—Plants Further Advanced Than in Grand Ronde—Echo Promises to Be Excellent Beet District.

F. S. Bramwell, field superintendent of the La Grande sugar factory, spent last night in the city, in the effort to engage Umatilla Indians in thinning and weeding the beet crop at Echo.

Mr. Bramwell says the crop at Echo is further advanced and more uniform and thrifty than the crops in Grand Ronde valley and that the plants are much more smooth and healthful than in the colder soil of Eastern Oregon.

He gathered several samples from the crops at Echo, to exhibit in La Grande. The young beets are as smooth and clean of defects in growth, as any ever grown in the choicest beet lands of Utah, where the world's record is held. The crop is now ready for thinning, and the form of the young plants indicate a high sugar percentage.

Mr. Bramwell feels confident that the Echo district will prove to be one of the leading beet producing sections of the west if the people will only try the experiment of planting them and cultivating them properly. Everything is favorable at Echo.

Joint Baccalaureate for High School and Academy by Rev. S. L. Penrose, of Whitman College, May 22—Superintendent Ackerman to Be Present Commencement Day.

The order of the different exercises of commencement week, and the participants, are now definitely known, comprising the following features and personnel. Sunday, May 22, baccalaureate sermon by Rev. S. L. Penrose, of Whitman College. In the exercises of this day Pendleton Academy will be equal sharers with the high school, the baccalaureate sermon and the accompanying exercises being a joint production. ### HEAVY VEGETABLE SHIPMENTS.

Walla Walla and Milton Send Out Tons of Green Stuff to the Mining Region.

Last night the O. R. & N. Spokane branch train brought down 80 crates of spinach, rhubarb, onions, radishes and lettuce from Walla Walla and Milton gardens, billed for Elgin, Baker City and Sumpter.

These shipments have been running very heavy this spring and when the strawberry crop begins to move, it is possible that another baggage car will be used to accommodate the trade.

The large scope of country in the Eastern Oregon mines that does not produce anything in the garden line, makes an excellent market for the early vegetables from this district, and the market gardening business is increasing in Umatilla county every year.

### PRESBYTERY MEETING.

Will Release Rev. Elder From Moro, and Probably Rev. Bleakney, From Grand Ronde.

The Presbytery of Eastern Oregon will hold a special meeting at the Presbyterian church this evening to release Rev. S. C. Elder from the charge of the church at Sumpter.

Arrangements will probably be made to release Rev. W. H. Bleakney from the work in the Grand Ronde valley, which he has been carrying on in addition to the principalship of the academy during the past year. Mr. Bleakney will remain with the academy next year.

### Mental Science Lectures.

Dr. Mary E. Sellen of Tarrytown, N. Y., who is a noted lecturer on mental science, has written to W. C. Burgess that she would be glad to deliver a lecture in this city in the near future if she could get sufficient encouragement to come. It is possible that a circle could be organized and a series of lectures and lessons instituted, if those interested would confer with Mr. Burgess and agree on dates and details of the lectures.
