#### GENERAL NEWS.

Judge Simpson, of Newton, Kan., was killed yesterday in an automobile accident.

A special from Yukon river says the river will be free from ice earlier this season than ever before known.

Henry Voelker, a member of the hospital corps at Honolulu, was drowned yesterday while bathing in the harbor.

Senator Clark entertained 2,000 children Arbor Day, May 10, at Butte, at Columbia Gardens, his pleasure resort.

Caleb Powers, condemned to death on the charge of killing Governor Goebel, of Kentucky, is writing a book of experiences.

The Servian government has decided to demolish the old palace which was the scene of the murder of King Alexander and Queen Draga.

Two negroes entered the home of Clarence Meyer, a Kansas City printer, and literally slashed him to pieces with razors. Robbery was the motive.

John Wallace, general manager of the Illinois Central railroad, has accepted the position of chief engineer in charge of the construction of the Panama canal.

Rev. O. P. Newell, pastor of the Marshalltown, Ia., Methodist church, was stricken with paralysis while in the pulpit and fell headlong to the floor. He cannot live.

#### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Alaskan exhibit at the St. Louis fair will contain 20,000 mineral specimens.

Jesse Caverdale, a pioneer farmer of Genesee, Idaho, died Wednesday aged 76 years.

Six telephone money boxes were robbed in Portland, Wednesday morning, the thieves securing about \$25 in all from the job.

Victor Emmel, a graduate of Pacific University, Forest Grove, Or., has received a complimentary scholarship at the Brown University.

H. A. Mondschain, a prominent jeweler of Blackfoot, Idaho, committed suicide Wednesday by taking prussic acid. He had been drinking heavily.

Fruit trees in Jackson county, are dying from some unknown cause, several orchards of young trees having been almost totally destroyed by the disease.

Fred Olson, a street car conductor, was killed in Portland Wednesday morning, by being struck with a live wire, over 6,000 volts of electricity passing through his body.

Postmaster Bancroft, of Portland, has refused to resign, notwithstanding the repeated hints that his resignation would be acceptable at the hands of the department.

The special bond election held at Eugene Wednesday, for the purpose of voting \$7,000 bonds for a water system, resulted in the defeat of the water bond issue, by a vote of 4, to 29.

The registration books will remain open in Portland until Monday evening, May 16, at the advice of John Manning, district attorney, who says the law means that the voters shall have a certain number of days in which to register, and because the 15th falls on Sunday, are entitled before the law, to the use of Monday, to make up the loss.

## HIGH SCHOOL MEET

BAKER CITY AND PENDLETON AT WALLA WALLA.

Interscholastic High School Meet Takes Place Tomorrow — Representatives From Baker City, Union and Pendleton to Compete in Oratorical Contests—Pendleton Team Leaves Tomorrow.

The Baker City high school team which competes at Walla Walla tomorrow, arrived this morning on No. 1, accompanied by Professor J. A. Churchill, superintendent of the Baker City schools. The team is composed as follows:

John Allen, discus, hammer and shot; Dan Kelley, 100 and 220 yards and high and running jumps; relay team, Ralph Dodson, Herbert Chandler, Stanley Parker and Jesse Richardson; Walter Richardson, one mile and one-half mile; Ralph Dodson, one-half and one-fourth miles; Roscoe Neal, pole jump and 100 yards. Rooters, Menzie McKim, James Mitchell, Harry Mitchell and Roscoe Doughdod.

Miss Osie Payton will represent the same institution in the oratorical contest. She accompanied the party in company with her sister, Miss Alma Payton, and Miss Edith Lafferty, of Union, who represents the high school of that city in the oratorical contest at Walla Walla.

The Pendleton team to the Walla Walla contest will go over tomorrow morning, as follows: Will Wyrick, captain, 100 and 220 yards; relay, Frank Pierre, James Reeves, Roy Leezer and Clarence Bollerman; Frank Pierre and James Reeves, 440 yards; Roy Leezer, 880 yards; Se Williams, hurdle race; Clarence Bollerman, broad jump; Lester Means and George Strand, hammer and discus.

Milton Shaw will compete in the oratorical contest. Ora Jay is not eligible because he is not yet in the high school, but is a member of the eighth grade. Lester Cronin cannot go to Walla Walla, being unavoidably detained at home by business.

#### CHINAMAN HAS TROUBLES.

Educated Celestial Tries to Serve Two Gods at Once in Baker City.
