POSTPONE GAS PLANT MATTER

COUNCILMAN ABSENT AND PROPOSITION LAID OVER.

Bills Are Allowed—Street Commissioner Appointed—Finance Committee Given Jurisdiction Over \$3,600 of Sinking Fund on Hand—Chairmen of Committees Transferred.

The most important action taken by the council last night was the postponement of the reconsideration of its action in relation to the location of the gas plant. The conclusion of the matter was a motion by Mr. Dickson to lay the matter over until the next regular meeting, which passed unanimously.

All the councilmen were present except Mr. Johnson, who is in Portland investigating the relation of gas plants to the health of nearby residents and to property valuations and comfort of the people who live nearby. The postponement was on account of Mr. Johnson's failure to return.

There was no discussion of the issue last night. Quite a number of the protestants were present and promptly disbanded when the council turned the subject over. Among the protestants Mrs. Elvira Teel of Echo, and her son, O. D. Teel, who own several residence properties adjacent to the present location of the

proposed plant, were represented by J. T. Hinkle, their attorney.

Two bills were presented and turned over to the committee for advising. One was by W. C. Minnis for \$7 for wood furnished the city. The other was by W. P. Shephard, for services as special enumerator of people subject to poll tax.

John D. Brown, who has been for some time on the police force, and was for a long time janitor at the court house, was appointed street commissioner by Mayor Matlock, and the appointment was unanimously confirmed.

It was shown that \$3,600 is on hand belonging to the levee sinking fund and to the general sinking fund, and a motion unanimously carried that the finance committee be given jurisdiction over the amount named, having authority to use its own judgment in regard to where to loan it, and at what rate of interest. The money is on hand from the redemption of county warrants in the amount named.

By request Mr. Dickson was transferred from the chairmanship of the claims committee to the chairmanship of the finance committee, and Mr. Johnson was transferred from the chairmanship of the finance committee to the chairmanship of the claims committee.

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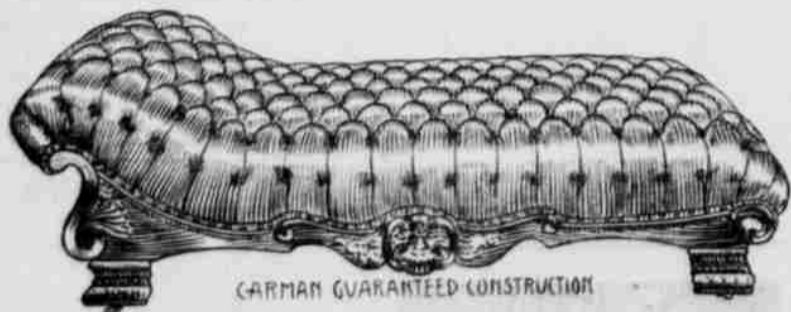
