#### GENERAL NEWS.

Ex-Queen Lilloukalanani is ill at St. Louis.

The republicans of Alabama have instructed for Roosevelt.

All Italy is praying that the coming Italian heir, which is expected in September, will be a boy.

It is expected that Florida democrats will instruct for Hearst in their state convention on May 20.

American Consul T. J. Cummings, at Puerto Cabello, Venezuela, died suddenly Thursday morning.

Two American officers and 15 men were ambushed and killed by Moros on the island of Mindanao, May 8.

Johnnie Bryant, a white boy, was killed in a prize fight with Walter Robbins, a negro, at Fresno, Cal., Thursday.

Supreme Commander Spinney, of the Bankers' Union, is accused of mobbing the order of \$20,000 during the past year.

A Greek Catholic priest, Father Tscherbakoffsky, led the Russian cavalry charge of the 11th regiment at Kinlien Cheng, on May 1.

The Newport News Shipbuilding Company denies that they are building submarine or other kinds of vessels for the Japanese government.

Ex-Mayor James A. Reed, of Kansas City, has withdrawn from the contest for the nomination for governor of Missouri, leaving the field open to Joseph W. Folk.

An unknown man was drowned at Kalama, Thursday morning.

The Oregon State Grange will hold its annual meeting at Corvallis on May 24-27.

Anthony Tongue, father of the late Thomas H. Tongue, died at Hillsboro Thursday, aged 84.

William H. Constance, of Seattle, shot and killed himself in Portland Thursday, despondency being the cause.

Mrs. Laura Adkins, of Dallas, Or., who was injured by falling through a rotten sidewalk, has been awarded \$112 damages.

Aurelia Harrara, of Bakersfield, Cal., won a glove contest over Louie Long, of Oakland, at Butte, Thursday, in the 20th round.

Citizens of Corvallis will erect a monument to the memory of James Dunn, who was killed there by young Reedy two weeks ago.

During the first four months of the year 1904, 567 births occurred in Portland, an increase of 25 per cent over the same period in 1903.

Oscar Johnson, who lost five fingers on a buzz saw in Inman & Poulson's mills at Portland, has sued the firm for \$1,000 for each finger.

A Crook county cattleman has called on the federal authorities to cause the big stock owners to tear down their fences on government land.

The queen of the Federation Fraternal Mardi Gras carnival, to be held in Portland June 28, will ride at the head of the procession in an automobile which will afterward be presented to her by the carnival committee.

Bruce Borders, a 14-year-old school boy of La Grande, who was severely injured by a 16-pound shot thrown by a companion, on April 26, has entirely recovered without a doctor's aid, his mother refusing all medical aid at the time.

## SOCIALISTS' CREED

NATIONAL PLATFORM ADOPTED AT CHICAGO.

**Demands Shorter Days of Labor, Pensions for Old and Infirm After Certain Number of Years' Service—Oregon Has Adopted Socialist Ideas in the Initiative and Referendum and Popular Election of United States Senators.**

The national socialist convention which met in Chicago last Monday and nominated Eugene V. Debs for President and Benjamin Hanford of New York, for vice-president, adopted the following national platform for the campaign of 1904:

"To the end that the workers may seize every possible advantage that may strengthen them to gain complete control of the powers of government, and thereby the sooner establish the co-operative commonwealth, the socialist party pledges itself to watch and work in both the economic and the political struggle for each successive immediate interest of the working class.

"For shortened days of labor and increase of wages.

"For the insurance of the workers against accident, sickness and lack of employment.

"For pensioners for aged and exhausted workers.

"For the public ownership of the means of transportation, communication and exchange.

"For the graduated taxation of incomes, inheritances and of franchise land values, the proceeds to be applied to public employment and bettering the conditions of the workers' children and their freedom from the workshop.

"For the equal suffrage of men and women.

"For the prevention of the military against labor in the settlement of strikes.

"For the free administration of justice.

"For popular government, including initiative, referendum, proportional representation and the recall of officers by their constituents, and for every gain or advantage for the workers that may be wrested from the capitalistic system, and that they may relieve the suffering and strengthen the hand of labor.

"We lay upon every man elected to any executive or legislative office the first duty of striving to procure whatever is for the workers' most immediate interest, and for whatever will lessen the economic and political powers of the capitalists and increase the like powers for the worker."

#### THE PROHIBITION TICKET.

Party Will Cast a Strong Vote in Several Precincts This Year.

The prohibition party of Umatilla hopes to cast 100 per cent more votes this year than in 1902. At the general election in 1902, the vote cast for C. J. Bright, prohibition candidate for supreme judge, was 270, which was said at that time to be practically the strength of the party in Umatilla county.

N. A. Davis, of Milton, who was the prohibition nominee for secretary of state in 1902, polled 395 votes, and G. W. Rigby, for state senator, polled 319, but it is admitted that these candidates ran ahead of the party vote.

The members of the party fully expect to see a vote of 450 to 500 polled this year, and now hope to carry the local option amendment on June 6. There is no division on the local option amendment, as members of all parties are working for and will vote for this amendment.

The prohibition candidates are as follows:

Rev. M. V. Howard, of the South Methodist church of this city, for joint representative of Umatilla and Morrow counties, against Dr. W. G. Cole of this city, republican nominee, and F. B. Holbrook, of Irigoin, democratic nominee.

For representatives N. A. Davis of Milton, and Rev. Robert Warner of this city, are the nominees. For sheriff, the party has named Oliver Dickson, and for county judge, Rev. G. W. Rigby of this city, who made the race for joint senator last election.

For county commissioner, F. H. Richmond has been nominated; for clerk, W. A. Bannister; for recorder, J. H. Leezer; assessor, W. Talbert; for treasurer, R. E. Stewart, and for coroner, G. O. Richardson.

The candidates of the prohibition party will not make a personal canvass for support, but will have speakers in the county to conduct an educational campaign.

#### MAY DISBAND.

Bartenders Think of Abandoning Their Organization.

There is some likelihood of the Bartenders' Union disbanding. Such action is contemplated, and either next Tuesday night, or possibly a week from that time, the question will be decided. It is held by some members of the union that its legitimate ends are not accomplished, partly because the saloon keepers themselves neglect or refuse to get together in matters of common concern.

The bartenders claim the interests of the saloon keepers equally with those of the bartenders themselves, would be conserved by the perpetuation of the union and a union of the employers similar to that maintained by the grocers.
