## THE LA DOW BLOCK

HISTORY OF ONE OF PENDLETON'S LARGEST BUILDINGS

Block Purchased by Mayor Matlock Was Partly Erected in 1885, and Finished in 1889—Was Formerly Property of George A. La Dow, a Pioneer of Pendleton—Through Litigation it Came into Possession of Realty Company.

The purchase of the La Dow block by Mayor Matlock, is one of the heaviest realty deals ever made in this city, and recalls one of the busiest building periods of Pendleton.

That portion of the La Dow block at the northeast corner of Johnson and Court streets, occupied by the Owl Tea House, was built in 1885, preceding the erection of the remainder of the building by four years. In 1889 the east 175 feet of the building was erected, carrying the structure clear through to Thompson street. The property thus has a frontage of 200 feet on Court street, and being 200 feet square, thus extends two-thirds of the distance through to Water street.

The ground thus described in area was for many years the property of George A. La Dow, and upon his demise his wife and two minor heirs came into possession. When they concluded to build upon the ground Frank E. La Dow had become of age; his brother, Louis M. La Dow, was yet a minor. It was necessary to get a loan to raise the funds to build with, and the ground described was put up as collateral. An order of court was secured giving the authority to mortgage the ground, and \$30,000 was raised by a mortgage upon it, and the building was erected.

After Louis became of age it became apparent that the property could not be made to pay out, and it eventually went into the hands of the mortgagees, the Jarvis-Conklin company. About this juncture Louis brought suit to recover his unimproved original interest, claiming irregularities in the proceedings, which claim included fraudulent representations to himself, to secure his consent to incumbering the ground to secure the loan spoken of.

The upshot of it was that he maintained his position, and was awarded by the courts an undivided one-third interest in the entire property—the business house and several residences on the side streets—which he held until he eventually disposed of it at his own pleasure.

In the early '90s the Pacific Realty Company became owner of the entire property in fee simple, which it held until the sale to Mr. Matlock a few days ago.

### SENATOR DALY RESIGNS.

Surveyor General Cannot Hold Two Offices.

State Senator John D. Daly, of Benton county, has followed the lead of Senator McGinn, and has tendered his resignation as senator, to take effect when his successor is elected and qualified, says the Salem Journal. His letter bears date of May 1, 1904, but was received by the governor this morning, and is as follows:

"Having accepted the office of surveyor general for Oregon, I hereby beg leave to tender my resignation as state senator for Benton county, to take effect on such date as my successor is legally qualified."

Henry W. Coe of Portland, has been nominated by petition to fill

the vacancy caused by the resignation of Senator McGinn, and will go on the ticket as the regular republican nominee.
