STILL ANOTHER BRICK BLOCK

DEPARTMENT STORE ON MAIN AND ALTA STREETS.

If Satisfactory Lease is Closed \$40,000 Building Will Be Erected Soon—Will Be Fitted for Special Department Store With Elevators and Stairways From First to Second Floors—Only Main Location Available for Such an Establishment.

A magnificent department store building, with a frontage of 75 feet and two stories high, is one of the immediate possibilities in this city. If satisfactory leases can be closed, such a building will be erected on the southeast corner of Main and Alta streets, opposite the Tallman drug store, on the ground now occupied by the restaurant, shooting gallery and tailor shop.

This is the only prominent location on Main street now available for just such a magnificent institution and it is possible that one of the finest department stores in the state will be located there.

The matter is now hanging on the details of the lease and if these are arranged satisfactorily the building will be started soon. The structure will cost something like \$40,000 and will be made into a first-class department store, with elevators and several stairways leading from the first to the second floor and stocked with one of the largest assortments of merchandise ever collected in one store building in Eastern Oregon.

ALL FAVOR THE CELEBRATION

MERCHANTS UNANIMOUS AND ENTHUSIASTIC.

All Argue That the Labor Unions Should Handle the Celebration—All Favor Making the Event a Success—If Pendleton is to Celebrate Everybody Says to Celebrate Right—Meeting of Trades Assembly Sunday Night Will Decide.

The following additional interviews from business men on Fourth of July celebration have been secured today. The sentiment favoring the celebration is so strong that it is now almost certain that the Trades and Labor Assembly will take definite action in favor of handling the event at the meeting to be held next Sunday night.

Public sentiment is heartily in favor of the celebration and also unanimously in favor of turning the management over to the labor assembly. It is the intention of the labor assembly to call a mass meeting of business men immediately after the meeting at which they are to decide upon the matter, if the celebration is agreed upon.

Sullivan & Bond—We are with the crowd in relation to celebrating the Fourth. Whatever a majority of the business men want to do we will second, and do our full share toward making a success. But we are somewhat handicapped now by Walla Walla having arrangements for a celebration well under way, and her advertising started. This will influence the size of our crowd.

Joe Basler—I stand pat with the majority, ready to do my share toward making a Fourth of July celebration a success, if it is understood to have one. But if we undertake it, let us by all means make a success of it. A failure to carry out the plans that may be made, or to accomplish anything that cannot be afterward rated as a success, ought to be left alone in the beginning.

R. Alexander—I heartily favor turning the Fourth of July over to the Labor Council, as I believe it will give us an economical and honest expenditure of the funds. I will do my full share, financially, and will lose no opportunity to boom the project on the side. Judging from Labor Day observance of last fall, the council is fully capable of giving us our full money's worth. We certainly ought to have a celebration, if we do not have a large amount of money is spent elsewhere that ought to be spent here, and besides, the interest of the people is diverted from this place, where it belongs.

W. J. Clark—Yes, let us have a celebration on the Fourth of July, and let us prelude it with real honest, capable management of the funds that there may be no grafts or mismanaged resources.

Frank O'Gara—Count us in on all necessary expense, but please divide the attractions, and not have everybody on Main street. Everybody on Court street is agreed that some consideration be shown this locality in this respect. If there are not assurances of this character, most of us may as well be counted out right in the beginning, however much we want a celebration. I am heartily in favor of the unions being entrusted with all the details of the affair, having confidence in the honesty and good judgment of the members thereof. Judging from the Labor Day observance which they gave us last fall, it will not be a mistake to turn the whole affair over to them.

ORIENTAL SOLD.

John Day Placer Mine is Purchased By Ukiah Parties Who Will Operate at Once.

The Oriental Mining Company, the camp of which is in Umatilla county and the plant in Grant county, both on the banks of the North Fork of the John Day river, has sold out to James Shipp and E. E. Gibbs, both of Ukiah. The property is 20 miles south of Ukiah. The consideration is not given, but it is understood Messrs. Shipp and Gibbs have a bargain.

The Oriental company was made up mostly of Sidney, O., people, and two years ago it put \$16,000 into a plant, but operated it but about a week. The snows were very light

the winter previous, and the water failed them in a short time, and gradually discouragement ruled in the counsels of the Oriental, with the result mentioned.

William Robinson, representing the company, was here last week and looked after the transfer. He found the plant itself in excellent condition but the floods had swept out the bridges and had necessarily done much damage. The plant was equipped for placer mining only.

Messrs. Gibbs and Shipp were in town several days this week, leaving for the John Day country yesterday. They will resume the operation of the plant immediately.

Woolgrowers' Association.

John W. Cannel, representing the Associated Woolgrowers, with head offices in Boston, and a branch office in Salt Lake, City, is in the city today. The association is an organization of woolgrowers and commission merchants having a system of warehouses and woolbuyers and making a business of holding consignments of wool for future sales. The association has several stockholders in Umatilla county, among the number being the J. E. Smith Livestock Company, W. M. Slusher, Douglas Belts, Tunis Swick and J. M. Hemphill.

Work Begun on Residences.

Dr. Whitaker has begun work upon his new residence on High street between Main and Garden. The foundations are completed, and the lumber on the ground. He has lately had two cottages remodeled on Garden street, between Tustin and High.

To Walla Walla Contest.

Miss Florence McCall, of the La Grande high school, passed through the city this morning, en route to Walla Walla, where she goes to represent that school at the interscholastic declamatory contest tonight.

Carload of Blue Rocks.

It is estimated that 100,000 blue rocks will be used by the coming Northwest tournament which meets in this place. They will make a full carload and cost, put down, \$700.

Hailey Will Irrigate.

H. G. Hurlbert, of Irrigon, is running lines and establishing levels on T. G. Hailey's Wild Horse farm, preparatory to the putting in of an irrigation system.

The pumps at the Golconda mine are kept constantly running during the shut-down for repairs, and the electric light plant is also operated every night. The shut-down is for an indefinite time, while repairs are being made.

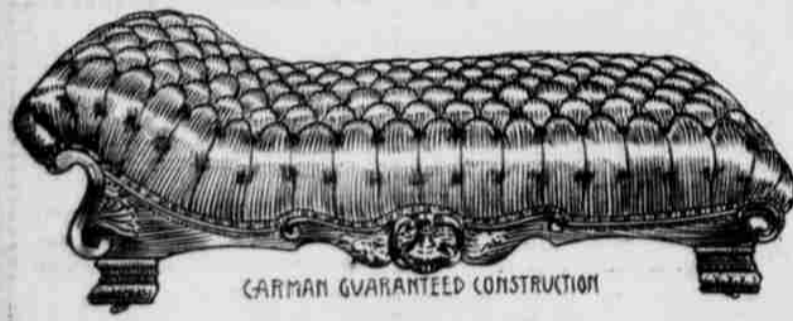
