PASSES AT ST. LOUIS

THE WAY OF THE DEAD.
HEAD IS TIRESOME.

Long Routine of Red Tape Necessary to Get Free Admission to the Exposition—Must Be Photographed and Measured and When You Are Through You Feel as if You Were a Convict.

St. Louis, May 13.—Thousands of people are asking for World's fair passes. A few are getting them. These few wish they hadn't asked for them, before they are through.

To begin with, you must file a written application at the executive offices. In this application you must give one thousand and one good and valid reasons why you should be a "dead-head."

The first time someone applies the term to you you get angry and want to hulk him. In 24 hours you are willing to admit its appropriateness. Of course, for reasons diplomatic, the principal reason why you want a pass—that is, because you do not want to pay good cash for admission—is not mentioned.

Well, somebody finally indorses your application and you get a printed order on the Electro Photo Coupon Pass Company for your picture, on presentation of this order and a receipt for \$2 for the cost of the photo.

If you have good luck, you will find in a day's wandering the man who will accept your money and give you a receipt. Most anybody will take your money, but the receipts are hard to find.

Next, you go to the Electric Photo Coupon Pass Company's shop. You find a long line ahead of you, winding in and out of a brass-rattled maze. You reach a nervous clerk, who seizes your receipt. It bears the number 711. The clerk grabs a metal holder, shoves the numbers 711 in it and pushes you into a narrow passageway.

There, under the electric light, which makes you look green and ghastly, another man seizes you. He grabs the number and sticks it in the railing, breast high. Then he yanks you over to the rail, jabs your head up, pulls your hat off and yells at you to "open your eyes."

As you do, you see a camera a few feet away, lowered by some electrical device; hear the click of the shutter and before you can get your breath you are hurled out into a narrow hall way.

"I feel like a convict," remarked one man, as he pulled himself together.

"I wonder if they worked the entire Bertillon system on us. But they didn't measure our feet. I'll bet I look like a pickpocket or a horse-thief in that picture."

The passes are books with 220 coupons, one good for each day of the fair, and the photo is on the cover.

EXPERIMENTS IN FEEDING.

Idaho Man Gives Some Interesting Figures From Special Tests.

"I have just completed making a trial balance of our experiment in the raising of mutton sheep in a small way on the Ellendale farm," said Lyman Reed of Reed & Son, owners of the farm, located a mile south of Moscow, and where for an engaged in raising registered sheep and hogs.

"We had been raising Hampshire Down and Dorset Horn sheep for some time. In the fall of 1901 it was decided to raise a few grade sheep for mutton.

"We bought common ewes, paying for them \$368.50, or about \$3 per head. They were run in the pasture with no particular care and at little expense. The ewes were bred to thoroughbred bucks. During the summer and fall of 1902, sales of mutton were made at a net profit of \$258. In selling we were careful to dispose of the wethers and older ewes.

"Last fall the net profit from mutton and wool sales was \$565.50, and between the 1st of January, this year, and April 15, our sales aggregated \$327.

"During this time the number of sheep in the band has been increased somewhat; the sheep have been developed from range sheep into half grades of a mutton character.

"In our opinion this experiment goes to show that one of the adjuncts of a farm in this section should be a small band of mutton sheep, sufficient in number to keep the fence and corners cleaned out and wild oats kept down. A band of 35 to 50 sheep requires little attention on a 160-acre farm and will pay better than any other investment the farmer can make."

The Ellendale farm, which comprises 190 acres of fine meadow land, is largely in grass, alfalfa, medium red clover and meadow fescue. Reed & Son are now putting in 15 acres in the meadow fescue. They have put in five acres of rape, and will seed four acres to Russian broom corn millet, the seed having been sent out by the agricultural department.

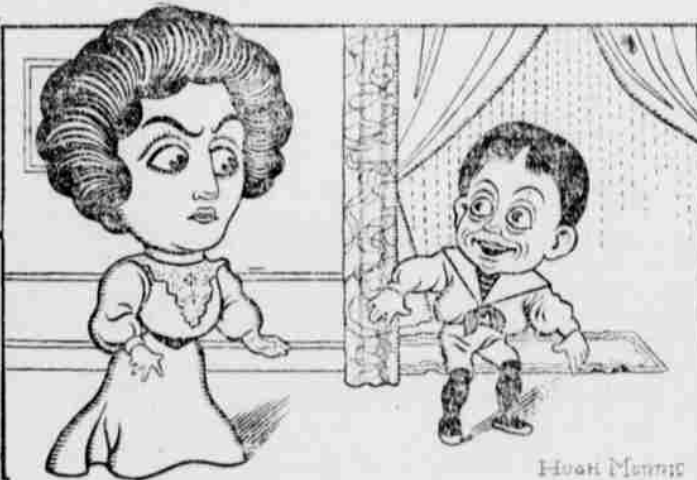
