GENERAL NEWS.

New railroad terminals to cost \$14,000,000 will be built at New Orleans, and the Rock Island has secured a right of way into that city.

The American Social Science Association, in session in Boston, is discussing the advisability of extending free public school benefits to adults.

The jury before whom ex-Mayor A. A. Ames, of Minneapolis, has been on trial charged with bribery, failed to agree, and was discharged after being out 40 hours.

H. G. Selfridge, formerly Marshall Field's general manager, has bought the Schlesinger & Mayer department store business in Chicago, paying therefor \$5,000,000.

Three Japanese are attending the international convention of mechanical engineers in Chicago. They came over on the same steamer with three Greeks and an Arabian.

Lieutenant-General Sir Clement Wilkinon, of the British army, in an interview in New York, predicts the ultimate complete success of Japan in the present war both on sea and land.

Agents of the Chinese government are secretly working the United States in an endeavor to secure American army men for the Chinese service. This is a part of the plan for the complete rehabilitation of the Chinese army.

The conservative democrats of Massachusetts, are in the saddle, the state committee having deposed George Fred Williams, the radical, from the chairmanship of the state committee, and substituted William A. Gaston, of the Cleveland school of democracy.

Astoria has just let a contract for \$8,000 worth of street improvements. George Irving, aged 17, was killed by a falling limb at Cathlamet, Sunday.

Rob Cahot, a Hoquiam taxidermist, was fined \$50 for killing an elk out of season, Saturday.

The Montana Press Association, consisting of 50 members, has gone in a body to St. Louis.

An epidemic of horse stealing is raging near Albany, three having been stolen in one night.

The Newberg Woman's Club raised \$35 for the Sacajawea monument fund, by giving an entertainment Saturday night.

W. E. Clark, an employee of the Oregon Paper Mills at Oregon City, was instantly killed Saturday evening by being caught in a belt.

"Sergeant" J. C. Smith, a well known pioneer of Walla Walla, died Saturday, aged 77. He went to Walla Walla from Rogue river in 1854.

A well known wheat farm on the Sand Ridge, in Union county, consisting of 440 acres, was sold Saturday for \$33 per acre. It is in the best belt.

Arne Freeman, a rich farmer of St. Helens, was instantly killed Sunday by being thrown from his wagon, while running a race with a neighbor on horseback.

The local option sentiment is very strong in all the Willamette valley towns, enthusiastic rallies having been called for nearly every night from now until election.

Temple, of Pendleton, and it is understood for the sum of \$2,800. Mr. McCullough contemplates moving to the Big Bend country in the near future, or soon after he gives up the ranch which will be the 25th of May.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Sitton, who have been guests of Mrs. C. E. Rogers, on Butter creek for the past few weeks, have gone to Pendleton to attend to business matters and to visit friends.

Asa B. Thompson and R. N. Stanfield are in California investigating the merits and workings of the machines used for chopping hay, that are a success in that country. It is satisfactorily demonstrated that the hay, when chopped, will fatten cattle better than when fed from the stacks. This machine also stacks the hay after cutting it, something after the way the straw stacks are made.

R. Jones and Charles H. Miller will leave for Astoria, Sunday, to be there on Wednesday, the 18th.
