Money for Fort Boise.
Main Walsh of Walla Walla, who this morning that the war department had set aside \$250,000 to operations to improve and enlarge the Boise barracks.
"It means a great deal for Boise," Walsh said, when discussing the matter. "It means that at one time and many friends among your people are glad to see the barracks enlarged to accommodate at least four to the present accommodations, which means that not less than \$200,000 will be spent in Boise every year in maintenance, besides the salaries to the officers and men. As to improvements to be made, of course I do not know, but of course it will be considerable and will furnish employment for a great many men. All of the money coming from the outside will be left here. It is certainly a thing for Boise."—Boise Statesman.

Potato Crop Make More Wheat?
His farm near Boyd last summer, J. B. Haverly had 50 acres of potatoes, and at present is marketing the last of his crop at one dollar hundred. He is so well satisfied with last year's results that he is planting 100 acres to potatoes this year. The potatoes are planted on a fallow, and Mr. Haverly believes they are beneficial to the soil. The ground on which a crop of potatoes is raised one year produces a crop of wheat the next.

Lamb Crop Good.
The work of marketing little lambs is at an end and the percentage shown is considerably in excess of expectations. Uncle Sam Knotts reports a per cent of 95; H. Henderson, Will Evans, Cunningham and Hemphill report between 95 and 100. Shearing is progressing and many have sold, not waiting for the sales days.—Pilot and Record.

Idaho Wool Sells Well.
Special from Payette: "Large sales of wool have been made here within the last few days. The clips are not all in yet, but about 15 cars have been shipped. The price paid was

near 15 cents per pound. A buyer reaped a good harvest by going out to the camps and buying. Over \$5000 have been realized by one middleman. Those who have sold are W. S. Brundage, C. Extension of Mail Routes.

In that event the mail would be carried from Seneca along the resident part of the valley, and people living along the road could erect mail boxes and have their letters and papers left at their doors, as do citizens of other parts of the western country. As it is now, they frequently have to go a long distance through all kinds of weather for their mail. As a consequence, they get the news and letters "from home" but once a week.—Grant County News.

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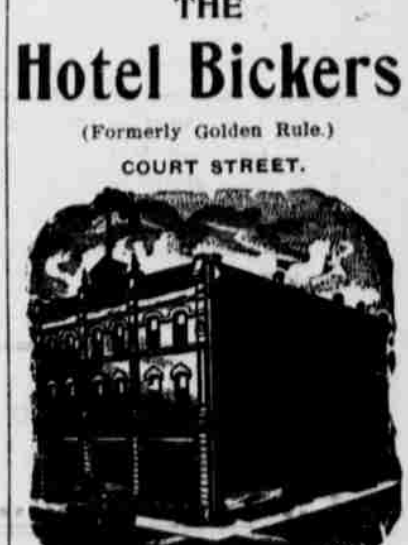

PRESS CONGRESS
OVER 3,000 EDITORS ASSEMBLED AT ST. LOUIS.
Forty Nations Represented in International Press Meeting at the Fair—"Press Parliament" Will Last Three Days This Week—Col. Henry Watterston Will Address the Meeting.

St. Louis, Mo., May 16.—Three thousand newspaper men, representing 41 foreign countries and every state and territory in the American Union, are gathered in St. Louis to take part in the various meetings to be held this week, which has been set aside by the exposition management as "World's Press Week."
The foreign countries represented include Canada, Mexico, England, Ireland, Scotland, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Norway, Sweden, Turkey, Greece, Russia, Denmark, Holland, Belgium, Chile and far-off Ceylon and Japan.
The sessions of the World's Press Parliament will be held in Festival hall the last three days of the week. The three days beginning today will be occupied with meetings of the National Editorial Association and the state and territorial press associations of the entire country. Nearly 1000 members of the National Editorial Association were present this morning when that organization began its annual meeting.
P. V. Collins of Minneapolis, president of the association, called the meeting to order and President Francis of the exposition, welcomed the visitors. The remainder of the opening session was taken up with President Collins' address, the reports of other officers, and the appointment of committees. The feature of the afternoon session was an address by Col. Henry Watterston of Louisville.

ALASKA IS RICH.
Spokane Man Hopes to See \$10,000,000 Mined There This Year.
"I expect to see \$10,000,000 in gold sent out of Alaska during the present year, aside from the Klondike, which I regard as a separate country," said A. E. Murphy, a mining man from Nome City, who, with Mrs. Murphy, was at the Spokesman yesterday.
"I believe that country is the richest in the world. There is plenty of ground to prospect and I expect to see some good properties discovered this year."
"Wages are \$5 a day and board, but then a man has to pay his transportation to get there and if he should get sick and have to go to a hospital he would lose much. With good luck and a full four months' work, which is the season, he could make \$400 to \$500."
"I have purchased a number of horses and mules here and am shipping them to Nome to work with the scrapers at my mine."
