#### GENERAL NEWS.

The National Federation of Musicians (Union Labor) is in session in New York.

May 14, Mrs. Amanda Orr, aged 44 years, was arrested for the 200th time in Baltimore for being a plain drunk.

The advent of the Santa Fe railroad into Oakland, Cal., was made the occasion for a tremendous jubilation.

A Santa Fe "pusher" engine exploded at Bagdad, in Southern California, killing the engineer and injuring the fireman.

Rear Admiral Kennedy, retired, formerly paymaster general of the navy, has been appointed treasurer of the Panama canal commission.

J. N. Barr, assistant president of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, is dead, aged 52 years. He was a very successful inventor of railroad appliances.

E. A. Roebler, a butcher of Colwyn, Pa., 15 years ago saved the life of Mrs. Martha Dobbs, of Pittsburg. She died recently and left him \$25,000 cash. Her daughter has supplemented the bequest with \$10,000.

Alonzo Bristow, of Bedford, Ia., sold 83 fine horses in Chicago for \$10,700. While on his way from one bank to another, a thief slit the satchel in which he had the money, and made a clean get-away with every dollar.

Two surgeons, an X-ray machine and an operation relieved the stomach of Paul Clarkson, a diamond thief of Galveston, of a \$250 stone. The owner of the diamond paid the expenses, and Clarkson was released without being prosecuted.

#### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

A movement is now on foot to drain Lake La Bish, in Marion county, and convert the land into farms.

Fred Vandergraft, a well known rancher of Gooding, Idaho, cut his throat in a fit of despondency, Monday.

The installation of the fireboat in Portland, will reduce insurance rates on the water front at least 12 per cent.

Warren H. Tollman, of Seattle, has declared his aspirations for the democratic nomination for governor of Washington.

E. R. Bryson, a young attorney of Corvallis, has just been appointed secretary of the republican state central committee of Oregon.

F. W. Valle, a prominent citizen of Portland, has been suggested for postmaster at Portland, in place of Bancroft, who will be removed.

There were 550 students at the Oregon Agricultural College, during the past year, this being the largest attendance of any Northwest college of its kind.

A. Thorstonsen, of Bellingham Bay, Wash., killed himself and his 9-months-old baby Monday, to escape the abuse which his wife practised upon him and the child.

William L. Church, county clerk of Clallam county, Wash., was killed Monday, by being thrown from his buggy, his wife who was with him, escaping with severe injuries.

N. M. and J. B. Duckworth, brothers, savagely fought a fist duel while drunk on the streets in Portland, Monday. They beat each other into unrecognizable shapes before being separated.

### PLAYED GOOD BALL

SKILLFUL, FAST AND FAIR FROM THE START.

Fourteen Innings to Play the Game Out, With a Tie on the Ninth—King and Knapp Made Records—Scarcely an Error From Start to Finish—Interesting and Successful Events in Sports.

The baseball game at Athena Sunday between the Wonders of Pendleton and the Athena team was one of the best and fastest that has been seen in this part of the country for some time.

Up to the ninth inning the game was in doubt, and at that time Athena tied the score. After that it took five innings to play off the tie, which was done in the 14th inning by Pendleton making three runs, ending the game with a score of 7 to 4 in favor of Pendleton.

The game was a good one, fast and furious from the first. All the men on both teams played their share of the game and Knapp, the catcher for the Wonders, and King, the pitcher, were the heroes of the game. Knapp played an errorless game behind the bat for the full 14 innings, and King pitched to him like a veteran. Strand at short, played a brilliant game, and took some of the hardest chances to be found on an infield, with perfect ease and assurance.

The game put up by the hosts was a good one—clean, and for the most part errorless. Up to the fourteenth inning when things went to the bad for a minute and lost them the game, the Athena boys were playing like machines. If all of the games can be as close and as interesting as the one of Sunday the baseball fans will have nothing to wish in the line of entertainment.

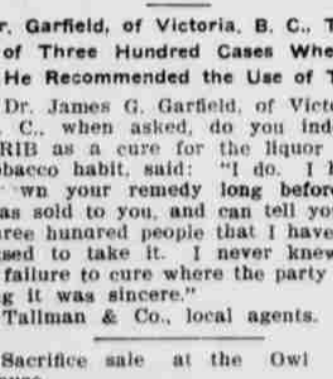
