Work on the Electric System.

Engineer Badger, with a crew of workmen, employed by the Oregon & Washington Power Company, have located pole lines for the wires through Milton, Weston, Athena, Adams and to Pendleton. The construction is going on as rapidly as possible. There are two crews at work now. One is building a concrete dam, the other is excavating and grading a six-mile flume. A road will be constructed by the county and company for the benefit of the farmers and the company at the cost of \$3,900.

YOUTHFUL HORSE THIEF.

Baker City Boy of 10 Has Stolen Three and Skipped.

Willie Smith, youthful robber of the Salvation Army barracks to the tune of about \$350, and who was turned out of jail because he was too young to send to the reform school, is subject to apprehension again, says the Baker City Herald.

He only stole three horses this time. Up to a late hour horse owners were scouring the country for the child horse thief, but no trace of him had been found. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Winfree was also looking for him. The stern-faced prosecuting attorney had the boy under his surveillance under a fad of his that any kind of animal or human being could be tamed by kindness.

When the boy was caught red-handed with nearly \$350 of the Salvation Army's money in his possession, the deputy prosecutor thought it was pretty tough. When it developed that the boy was under 10 years of age he did not know what to do with him.

But last evening's story told the tale. The boy had stolen three horses within 24 hours at that time. How many he has stolen since has not been reported.

SHEARED 7,000 SHEEP.

Ten Thousand More Be Handled at Steen Corrales, Near Lewiston.

W. R. McCall arrived in the city yesterday from the Steen shearing sheds, where he had been employed for some time, says the Lewiston Tribune. Mr. McCall reports that about 7000 sheep have now been sheared at the Steen pens and about 10,000 will remain to be sheared. This will represent the clip of the upper country and will be completed in about two weeks. The sheep are averaging well, giving a clip of 10 pounds to the sheep.

The range is now in good condition and spring lambs are in fine shape. The wool from the Steen pens will probably be brought to the city by the steamer Mountain Gem.

The first wool sale of the season was reported yesterday when Mr. E. H. Clarke, representing the Koshland company, of Boston, bought 40,000 pounds from Mr. Walker, the well known Pataha sheepman. The price has not been made public. The wool purchased is at the Alpowal landing. Quotations on wool at Lewiston range from 11 to 13 cents.
