## CLUB FEDERATION

WOMEN'S ORDERS ARE IN SESSION AT ST. LOUIS.

Largest General Federation Ever Held in Point of Numbers—Interesting Schedule of Subjects Will Be Discussed at the Educational Session—Only Two Active Candidates for President.

St. Louis, May 17.—It is safe to assert that the Odeon theater never held a larger nor a more intelligent audience than that of this afternoon on the occasion of the formal opening of the biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. From the parquet to the top-most gallery the auditorium was filled with representative women from every state and territory of the union. On the stage were seated two score or more of women whose names are familiar throughout the country. The roll call showed the convention to be the largest in point of numbers ever held by the federation.

It was a case of "ladies first" with Mayor Wells and President Francis of the exposition. A half dozen conventions opened in St. Louis today and the two officials were supposed to deliver welcoming addresses at nearly all of them. In order that both officials might be on hand to welcome the fair visitors to the biennial all conflicting engagements were cancelled.

After several selections of music the convention was opened with an invocation by Mrs. Caroline Bartlett Crane of Michigan. In addition to the greetings on behalf of the city and the exposition there were addresses of welcome by Mrs. Philip N. Moore, president of the Missouri state federation, and Mrs. W. E. Fischel, representing the federated clubs of St. Louis. The response was made by Mrs. D. T. S. Denison, president of the general federation. These formalities and the appointment of committees occupied the time until adjournment.

Tomorrow morning will be devoted to routine business connected with the affairs of the federation. In the afternoon there will be an educational session, the speakers and subjects being as follows: Mrs. Frank L. Wean, of Illinois, "Compulsory Educational Laws and their Enforcement;" Miss Daisy Spickard of Nebraska, "Character Building in Public Education Indirectly by Means of Literature and History;" Mrs. Jonathan F. S. Mitchell of Washington, "Character Building in Education Directly by Required Instruction as in France;" Mrs. C. E. Bush of Connecticut and Miss Mary A. Bacon of Georgia, "A National Aspect of Public Education." Tomorrow evening will be devoted to a discussion on "Child Labor," with reports from various parts of the country and an address by Edgar G. Murphy on "Child Labor in America."

Who will be the new president of the federation? This is the question which is uppermost in the minds of the delegates just now, and is the cause of a spirited campaign that would do credit to a political convention of the first magnitude. Mrs. Denison, of New York, the present head of the federation, has declined to be her own successor. Her withdrawal leaves the contest between Mrs. Patt-Decker of Colorado, and Mrs. Robert J. Burdette of California. These are the only active candidates in the field and the running between them appears to be about even. With the convention about evenly divided between the two it is not improbable that a "dark horse" may be brought into the race with good chances of success.

### WISCONSIN DEMOCRATS.

Prospects That Hearst Cannot Get Instructions.

Milwaukee, Wis., May 17.—The democratic state convention opened in the Davidson theater today with every prospect of a lively tussle over the selection of delegates to the St. Louis convention.

The contest for control is between the Hearst following and the supporters of Edward C. Wall, the democratic national committeeman for Wisconsin. Mr. Wall has announced his candidacy for the presidential nomination and has been conducting a vigorous campaign, not with any idea of receiving the nomination, but with the avowed purpose of preventing Hearst from securing the support of the Wisconsin delegation at St. Louis. The indications are that he will succeed in preventing Hearst instructions at today's convention.
