



A few days ago Mr. Clarke made the first purchase of the season when he secured 40,000 pounds at Alpowal. and it is believed that during the present week other sales will be re-ported. It is estimated that there is now a quarter million pounds of wool ready for the market in the Lewiston W.

Sheep buyers have also been active in this field for the past few days and it is reported that a big shipment will oon be made from Lewiston
