The Methodist general conference at Los Angeles will adjourn May 30. The Pacific coast conference of Unitarian churches is in session at San Francisco.

The United Brotherhood of Railway Employees will at once remove its headquarters from San Francisco to Chicago.

United States Senator Quay, of Pennsylvania, is believed to be suffering from his last illness at Washington, D. C.

Ex-City Treasurer T. J. McGeoghan, of San Jose, Cal., has been indicted on the charge of embezzling \$9,823.07 of the city's funds.

Susan B. Anthony is on her way to Berlin to attend the International Women's Council and International Suffrage convention.

Ohio Republicans are celebrating at Columbus, in conjunction with their state convention, the 50th anniversary of the founding of the party in that state.

Ex-Queen Liliuokalani of Hawaii, is on her way home from Washington, greatly disappointed. She will renew her claims attack upon congress next session for \$250,000.

ABOUT THE RED BOY.

Some Interesting Details of the Valuable Sumpter Property.

The mine was equipped as a cost of \$225,000. The steam plant consists of three Sederholm boilers of 480 horsepower, built for a working pressure of 130 pounds, says the Granite Gem.

The machinery includes a duplex 20x40 Corliss engine, driving the hoist, which has a capacity of 2000 feet at a speed of 1500 feet per minute; one single Riedler air compressor, with 18x36 inch compressor driven by a 20 x36 inch single non-condensing Corliss engine, so arranged that it can be compounded in the future.

The plant in addition, is equipped with all modern pumps, drills, air receivers, sawmill of large capacity, 20-stamp ore mill with a capacity of 60 or 80 tons per day, Johnson concentrators, crushing machinery, ore bins, etc.

The Red Boy property has been developed on five distinct veins, more than 10,000 feet of work having been done. Up to January 1, 1902, the mine earned net \$412,203, from a tonnage of 83,373. It was estimated at that time that there was a tonnage in sight of 350,000, at an estimated net value per ton of \$5.

At the present time the shaft and lower levels of the mine are full of water and this will have to be pumped out before work can be resumed. This it is thought can be done in a month's time.

The property owns the magnificent water power of Olive lake and other reservoirs having a storage capacity of 183,000,000 cubic feet.

It was the plan of the old company to utilize this water power in the operation of this plant for which 1,000 horsepower was to be reserved, the balance to be marketed. Many plans were made for electric power plants and tramways based on this water power.

COUNTY SEAT FIGHT.

Bitter Contentions of Union County Towns Will Be Settled at the Polls.

A gentleman from La Grande today stated that the Union county seat question was by no means settled. He said that although Circuit Judge Eakin had refused to interfere on a recent application to stop the election that the attorneys this morning began another intercity proceeding.

He stated that Union, the county seat was sure she could not defeat the move by popular vote and that she was moving heaven and earth to defeat it by technicality of the law. The county seat fight will also be everything else in the coming campaign.

Nebraska State Shoot.

Columbus, Neb., May 18.—The annual meeting and tournament of the Nebraska Gun Club opened here today for a three days' session, with a large number of crack shots present from various parts of the state. A much larger attendance is expected on Thursday and Friday. Excellent scores were made in some of the preliminary events today.
