UNDERTAKING PARLORS IN CONNECTION.

MEMBERSHIP IS INCREASING

COMMERCIAL ASSOCIATION
ADDS SEVEN MORE.

Privileges of the Association Parlor Extended to the Sportsmen Who Will Attend the Tournament Here in June—Leon Cohen Would Have the Association Help Build a Piece of Model Road in Umatilla County—Details of the Farmers' Institute Arranged.

The adjourned meeting of the Commercial Association, held last night, was well attended and great interest was taken in the various matters that came up for discussion.

Seven new members were added to the association as follows: H. J. Stillman, M. E. Williams, Guy W. Wade, William Ingram, P. D. Burdett, E. T. Wade and L. G. Frazier.

President Borie reviewed the progress of the association during the past two months in which the membership has sprung from 40 to 95 with the prospect of a continued increase in numbers and interest. He expressed the belief that after the 100 mark has been reached, that some action looking to the reduction of the monthly dues be taken in order to stimulate a further increase and to hold the membership up to this high point.

T. C. Taylor complimented the president on the progress of the association and moved to extend the privileges of the association rooms to the members and visitors of the Northwest Sportsmen's Association, which holds a meeting here in June. This motion was heartily concurred in and C. C. Berkeley, a member of the Pendleton Sportsmen's Association and also an active member of the Pendleton Commercial Association, was instructed to notify the sportsmen of the action.

Leon Cohen, ever awake to the interests of the city and the county, suggested that the association, in conjunction with the county, or the city, make an effort to build a small amount of model country road at some point in the vicinity of Pendleton, in order to demonstrate the feasibility of good roads to the people of this county.

He called attention to the millions of tons of rock lying idle within the city limits, which could be cheaply reduced to crusher rock for road building material and suggested that some action be taken looking toward at least a quarter of a mile of model road.

The matter was referred to the road committee of the association for further consideration.

Following the meeting of the association, the committees having in charge the Farmers' Institute to be held in this city on May 26, met and arranged the final details for the institute.

It was decided to engage McMinn's band for that occasion, to play at the beginning of both the forenoon and afternoon programs.

Seats will be arranged on the court house grounds, if the weather is good, and the meeting will be held on the lawn in front of the court house. If it should rain, the meeting will be held in the court house.

The speakers will be furnished by the O. R. & N. company and the Commercial Association will entertain them during their stay here.

Those who will address the meeting are Professor James Withycombe, of the Oregon Agricultural College, Professor H. T. French, of the Idaho Agricultural College, Professor C. L. Smith, of Spokane, Professor F. L. Kent, dairy expert at Oregon Agricultural College, and possibly several local speakers.

ON THEIR WEDDING TRIP.

R. D. Fulton and Wife, of Portland, Touring the Northwest.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert D. Fulton, of Portland, are guests of the Hotel Pendleton. Mr. Fulton, who is one of the owners and the traveling representative of the Northwest Oil & Paint Co., was married in Portland a short time ago and is now combining his wedding trip with business, by taking his bride with him over his territory.

Mr. Fulton is the one who discovered the fire in the Hotel Pendleton 14 months ago, and who, with a few other guests, fought the flames until they saw the task was hopeless before giving the midnight alarm that brought the department to the scene.

ASTORIA NOT LARGE ENOUGH.

Next Session Grand Lodge Must Be Held Elsewhere.

T. F. Howard, past grand patriarch of the grand encampment of the I. O. O. F., returned this morning after attending the sessions of the encampment at Astoria.

In the opinion of Mr. Howard there is no city in the state that can handle the grand lodge comfortably outside of Portland. There were at least 800 people in attendance as delegates to the grand lodge and to the meetings of the Rebekahs, and the hotel accommodations were swamped and then people were left to shift for themselves.

There was no great change made in the workings of the encampment, a few slight amendments to the constitution recently adopted being ratified.

GOING TO ALASKA.

The Babbs Have Extensive Horse Interests Up There.

A. H. Babb of Portland, is in town visiting with his father, W. H. Babb, the horseman, and will accompany

him the latter part of the week or the first of the next to Medicine Hat, N. W. T., where they will have about 200 head of horses for sale.

Mr. Babb shipped a train load of horses to that place last summer, and had excellent luck in disposing of them. He will now return with all the large horses he has been able to pick up during the past few months, there being a good demand for them on the part of the farmers and ranchmen who are settling up that country.

Mrs. Babb will accompany her husband, and the party will be absent for the summer.

OREGON'S SCHOOL FUND.

State Has Four Million Dollars on Interest.

The state of Oregon now has \$4,000,000 of school funds drawing interest at an average of 6 per cent. This is the largest sum the state ever had drawing interest and it represents the limit of irreducible school fund, for a number of years hence, at least. The revenue from this fund will be about \$240,000 per year and from this the expenses of running the state and land department must be paid, amounting to less than \$10,000 per year, leaving about \$230,000 to be distributed annually among the counties of the state upon a basis of school population. The apportionment this year will be reduced somewhat by reason of repayment of interest received from purchasers of land where the title failed.

Of this total of \$4,000,000, about \$3,500,000 is in the form of loans, and \$500,000 is in the form of deferred payments on sales of school land. Of the loans, \$3,250,000 is out on real estate mortgage securities paying 6 per cent interest.

"UNDER TWO FLAGS."

Will Be Presented Under Auspices of Eastern Star.

William Edgar Graham, formerly a member of the Frawley company, is in the city and will, between this and the first week of June, place the thrilling drama, "Under Two Flags," on the stage at the Frazier, under the auspices of the ladies of the Eastern Star.

The proceeds from the production will go towards the music fund of the Eastern Star, the ladies of that order having undertaken to buy a piano for their lodge room.
