James N. Sutton, of Portland, successfully passed the naval examination and is now a midshipman, having been directed to report at Annapolis on June 14.

 Now nearly all of these gentlemen have served one term in their respective offices and each one of them has certainly made a clear record for honesty, integrity, ability and economy in all of the various details of county affairs pertaining to their office and greatly reduced the expenses of their office, which is a brand new and very pleasant experience for good old Umatilla county.

Democratic Economy.

I can yet remember back when I used to hear the cry raised "That if the democrats ever get into office then the county will be forced into bankruptcy, etc." But nevertheless, two years ago the democrats of Umatilla county took charge of a number of the principal offices in the county, and although great improvements have been made all along in the affairs and institutions of the county, yet we find that a great saving has been made of the taxpayers' money, and the county almost out of debt at the same time.

Then, again, two years ago there were certain democrats elected to the legislature as senators and representative, and every one of them kept faith with the people who elected them, and though a number of good bills were presented by them and enacted into laws, yet Governor Chamberlain was never compelled to call an expensive extra session of the legislature for the purpose of correcting any mistakes made by either Senator Pierce or Smith.

And now a word about our present county assessor, Mr. Strain. He is another democrat, yet today he is everywhere acknowledged as the most conscientious, fearless, honest and the most capable assessor that this county or any other county ever had.

Only for his righteous assessments of corporations, etc., the people in this county would today be compelled to pay a 33-mill tax instead of 20 mills.

I would suggest that in his case the rule be suspended and that Mr. Strain be given the unanimous vote of Umatilla county on June 6th, irrespective of party or politics.

Convicted of Charge of Peddling Without a License.
