DEMOCRATIC RALLY.

Over 100 People Go From This City to Attend the First Campaign Gathering.
Over 100 people took advantage of the excursion rate on the O. R. & N. today to attend the democratic rally at Echo, McMinn's band accompanying the crowd and furnishing music for the occasion.
Colonel James H. Raley, democratic candidate for district attorney F. B. Holbrook, democratic candidate for joint representative between Umattilla and Morrow counties, were the principal speakers.
William Blakeley, candidate for the legislature, made a brief address in which he gave an outline of the needed legislation for this county and Eastern Oregon, and C. P. Strain addressed the meeting at length on the assessment question.
He reviewed his position and work in raising the values of railroad property and brought out prolonged applause in the telling arguments sustaining his policy.
J. E. Cherry, democratic candidate for county clerk, also made a brief address outlining his views on the policy of the clerk's office if he were elected and made a favorable impression on the voters.
The meeting was held under the auspices of the Echo Democratic Club and was successful from every point of view. A large attendance from all over the Butter creek country was present and this first democratic rally of the campaign was encouraging.
A grand free ball will be given to-night and many Pendleton people will remain over to attend.
In order to accommodate fishing parties the O. R. & N. Co. will, until close of season, have train No. 2, leaving here at 5:45 p. m., stop at North Fork on Saturday evenings, and train No. 1, due in Pendleton at 9 a. m., stop at some place Monday morning. This arrangement will be in effect Saturday, May 14.

FIGHT FOR RATES


PACIFIC COAST JOBBERS CONFER WITH RAILROADS.

Spokane Contends for Terminal Rates and Coast Towns Are Fighting Against It—San Francisco, Portland and Seattle Have Delegates in Chicago and a Warm Meeting is Anticipated.

Spokane, May 20.—The committee representing the Jobbers & Manufacturers' Association of Seattle left that city Monday night for Chicago, where, with similar committees from Portland, Tacoma and San Francisco, they will meet the traffic officials of the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads to resist the contention of the jobbers of Spokane for terminal rates.
The committee consists of James S. Goldsmith and H. E. Swift of the Schwabacher company; I. H. Jennings, secretary of the Merchants' Association, and J. C. Lang of the National Grocery Company. Mr. Lang is already in the East and will meet the balance of the committee in Chicago.
Portland sends six representatives, San Francisco two and Tacoma two, the latter being C. H. Hyde of the West Coast Grocery Company and Mr. Richardson of Hunt and Mottet.
The immediate cause of the conference, as explained by the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, is the demand of the Spokane jobbers for terminal rates and for control of the territory within 100 miles of Spokane.
The Seattle, Portland and Tacoma representatives will fight the Spokane demand, on the ground that that city being an intermediate point, is not a terminal, and that it would be unjust to the coast cities to make it so.
Coast jobbers think they should be permitted to meet St. Paul half way with equal rates, whereas now the latter city can come 900 miles west under a tariff that permits Seattle, Portland and Tacoma to go but 300 miles east.
