GENERAL NEWS.

David R. Gray, of Salt Lake City, has been appointed district freight and passenger agent for the Oregon Short Line.

The mansion of Thomas R. Turner, the capitalist, was burned at San Mateo, Cal. Among the losses was \$10,000 worth of diamonds.

The American consul at Puerto Cortes, Honduras, says 3,000,000 bunches of bananas will be shipped to the United States from Honduras this year.

The failure of a dry goods firm in New York has thrown a stock of goods valued at \$1,200,000 upon the "slaughter market," all of which will be sold at auction.

If Charles F. Pircher, formerly postmaster at Carrollton, Ala., is convicted of all the fraud charges brought against him, he can be sent to the penitentiary for 180 years.

William V. Cleveland, an insane man in the Indianapolis asylum, was scalded to death in a bath tub by another patient holding him down and turning on the hot water.

Doris Wilson, aged 4, the daughter of a wealthy Seattle family, was kidnapped Friday, but the police found the child a few hours later, the kidnapers having evidently abandoned her, through fear of arrest.

The body of a Japanese found floating in the bay at Gray's Harbor, has been moored by the neck to a tree for a week, awaiting a coroner to hold an inquest over the remains. Two coroners have been notified. The body was found by fishermen, who moored it for safe keeping.
