## MANY GAME BIRDS

QUAIL AND CHINESE PHEASANT IN HUDSON BAY.

Settlement of the Country and Reclamation of the Desert induces This Rapid Increase—Quail Can Be Heard Every Morning Along the Irrigation Ditches and Pheasants Are Often Seen Near the Barnyards.

The number of Chinese pheasant and quail is multiplying rapidly in the Hudson Bay district near Free-water. It is no uncommon sight to see the flashing colors of the pheasants in the alfalfa fields and to hear the piping quail in the early morning along the irrigating ditches.

The law protects these birds and the settlers add a special vigilance to the enforcement of the law, and are proud to see both these game birds multiplying there.

The gradually increasing reclamation of the Hudson Bay district will hurry up the propagation of these birds by furnishing more and more fields and crops to shelter them. The last year has witnessed a very rapid increase in their numbers.

Occasionally a mower in the alfalfa fields discovers a hidden nest of the pheasant, but this bird is not easily discouraged and an accident of this kind does not drive them out of the field. They either slip back to the unsheltered nest after the farm hands have disappeared, or sit on the fences near by for a day or so, and finally leave the vicinity, reluctantly.

This district promises to be one of the most favored localities for the rapid growth of these species of game birds, on account of the many new orchards, fields and irrigating ditches, along which they can find fresh feed and sheltered places in which to nest. The pheasant is very shy at first, in the vicinity of the farm house, but gradually grows accustomed to the activity and is often seen on the barnyard fences watching the fowls on the farm.

The quail are particularly numerous in Hudson Bay and can be heard every morning of the year calling along the ditches in the growing alfalfa.

The game law regulating the protection of these birds prohibits the killing of the Chinese pheasant at any time and the closed period for quail ends on October 15, 1905. After that date the season for killing quail will be open each year from December 1, until October 15 of the following year.
