GENERAL NEWS.

F. J. Marshall, the international chess champion, is from Brooklyn, N. Y., and is 27 years old.

Count Frederick Rovertera-Salandra, for 35 years Austrian ambassador to the vatican, is dead.

Mme Nordica, the singer, has been refused a divorce from her latest husband, on the grounds of insufficient cause.

J. Pierpont Morgan has during the past three years made \$17,000,000 as commission on big negotiations which include the Panama deal.

Nicholas Barbatto, a physician and a socialist member of the Italian parliament, has resigned and will remove to America to practice medicine.

It is claimed that beavers are so numerous in Cascade county, Montana as to be a nuisance in the destruction of timber and damming of streams.

Gymnasium directors and sports and enthusiasts generally, note everywhere the peculiar adaptability of women for swimming, both in speed and endurance.

At this time Parker has 132 instructed delegates. Hearst 102, Wall 30, Gorman 12, Olney 25, while 157 uninstructed delegates have been chosen, with 23 states to hold conventions in June.

Ormonde, the famous racehorse, was killed at San Francisco May 24 to relieve his sufferings. He had been partially paralyzed for a long time.

United States Senator A. G. Foster has announced his intention of striving for appropriations amounting to \$1,000,000 for federal buildings at Spokane.

John Frey, formerly of Salem, was drowned May 18 near Fort Wrangle, Alaska, by his fishing boat upsetting. He was engaged in salting salmon on Etolin Island.

Robert Pettigrew, of Butte, president of the Northwestern Improvement Company, has been arrested on a minor charge in connection with the strike of 600 coal miners.

DISEASE FIGHTERS MEET.

Pennsylvania Has a State Organization.

Gettysburg, Pa., May 26.—Members of the Associated Health Authorities and Sanitarians of Pennsylvania are gathered here for their eleventh annual meeting. The annual address will be delivered this evening by Dr. Cressy L. Wilbur, expert statistician of the United States census bureau.

The proceedings will continue through Friday and Saturday. The principal subjects of discussion will be smallpox, as illustrated by the present epidemic of that disease throughout Pennsylvania; typhoid fever, especially in relation to the recent serious epidemic in Butler and its present prevalence in the city of Philadelphia, and needed sanitary legislation. The possibilities of the prevention of typhoid fever by proper systems of filtration will be especially demonstrated.

Hay Scarce in Baker County.

Perhaps during the past 20 years there has not been such a complete clean-up of hay as present conditions indicate in this section. All of the low grades was fed out during the winter and as farmers found out how much they had to spare after turning out their stock, they had it baled and put on the shipping market so that now one might travel for 10 miles and not find a car for sale. This is unnatural as it is yet two or three months before new baling hay will be ready under most favorable conditions, and conjecture has it that there will be \$20 hay in this section within 60 days. The farmers here are fortunate as there have been put into their pockets some \$30,000 for their good hay crops.—Haines Record.
