Hay Scarce in Baker County.

Perhaps during the past 20 years there has not been such a complete clean-up of hay as present conditions indicate in this section. All of the low grades was fed out during the winter and as farmers found out how much they had to spare after turning out their stock, they had it baled and put on the shipping market so that now one might travel for 10 miles and not find a car for sale. This is unnat-ural as it is yet two or three months before new baling hay will be ready under most favorable conditions, and conjecture has it that there will be \$20 hay in this section within 60 days. The farmers here are fortunate as there have been put into their pockets some \$30,000 for their good hay crops.—Haines Record.
