THE WELCOME RAIN

WEEKLY CROP REPORT IS
HIGHLY FAVORABLE.

Ranges of Eastern Oregon Better Than for a Number of Years—Some Slight Damage Done by Frosts—Corn Planting and Gardening Well Under Way—Berry Crops Promise to Be Especially Heavy.

The following government crop report covering Eastern Oregon districts, has been issued from the Portland office:

Good rains occurred last Tuesday and Wednesday nearly everywhere in the state, and since then the weather has been warm and bright, which has promoted the rapid growth of all early sown crops. The top soil near the close of the week in some localities was beginning to get dry, and many correspondents reported that more rain was needed for late seeded grain and for recently planted corn, as these crops were making a relatively slow growth.

The ranges are better than for a number of years, and stock is in excellent condition. The flow of milk in the dairy districts is abundant, and the supply being received at the creameries has about reached its maximum point for the year. Sheep shearing continues in some localities, but this work is drawing to a close in most places. The wool clip promises to be up to the average both in quantity and quality.

Fall wheat is making satisfactory advancement and early sown spring wheat, barley and oats are thrifty and promising. A few complaints have been received of damage done to spring as well as to fall wheat by wire worms. Corn planting is well along and potato planting is advancing rapidly.

Hops, gardens, and field onions have done well during the week, and in general the outlook for staple crops throughout the state is most promising. Early blooming fruit was considerably thinned by the late frosts, but fairly good yields are expected of all varieties except Italian prunes, which in many sections will be a complete failure. Apples have set well.

Columbia River Valley.

Hood River, Wasco county, P. D. Heinrichs—Warm weather at last; vegetation growing rapidly; rain much needed; strawberries will soon be ripe.

Smock, Wasco county, W. D. Morehouse—Wheat looks well; corn nearly all planted; this week will finish spring plowing.

Grant, Sherman county, Charles H. Tom—Fall and spring wheat growing fast; volunteer barley heading; prospects good for a large fruit crop.

Gooseberry, Morrow county, C. E. Lundell—Fine shower the 17th, crops progressing nicely; summer following nearly completed; some spring grain damaged by worms.

Weston, Umatilla county, M. M. Baker—Wheat looking well though not making rapid growth; cherries promise a fine crop and fruit trees of all kinds in good condition; plenty of pasture; vegetables much benefited by the recent rains, about half an inch here, much more on the mountains, where it was badly needed.

Plateau Region.

Joseph, Walla Walla county, S. M. Crow—Warmer than last week; late sown grain germinating rapidly and early grain rooting and getting a good start; grass fine and stock is rapidly putting on flesh; cherries, plums, pears and apples blooming; currants and gooseberries loaded with bloom; potatoes being planted; gardens advancing slowly.

La Grande, Union county, W. F. Gekeler—Weather warm with a few light showers; considerable early fruit damaged by the freeze of two weeks ago; potatoes and gardens nearly all planted; early potatoes up; fall wheat continues to look splendid; wire worms have damaged some small patches of spring grain.

Clarno, Wheeler county, L. H. Hale—Good rain 17th; alfalfa cutting begun; stock getting fat; frost killed early fruit in some localities, but bulk of fruit crop is promising.

Rockcreek, Baker county, J. K. Fisher—Weather fine with one good rain; all crops greatly improved; pastures and winter wheat being irrigated; all fruit trees in full bloom; no damage by frost yet; gardens doing nicely.

Warm Springs, Crook county, P. Kallama—Some late spring grain not doing well; fall grain of all kinds growing rapidly; gardens good; prospects favorable for good crop of hay.

WONDERFUL FRUIT PRICES.

Eight Pounds of California Cherries Bring \$70 in Philadelphia.

The California deciduous fruit season has opened with the shipment of a box of Sacramento valley cherries. The first box, which was grown near Vacaville, Solano county, was closely followed by a box of cherries grown near Sacramento and others grown in the Winters district in Yolo county and in the Newcastle district of Placer county. Following these shipments were made from various fruit districts of the Sacramento valley.

Notwithstanding the fact that ripe California cherries are usually shipped earlier in the season, sometimes as early as March, the initial shipments brought very fancy prices. The first box was sold in Chicago for \$25, \$3.12 a pound. The second sale was made in New York and the figure was \$21. The third sale, made in the city of Philadelphia, at auction, was a record breaker, eight pounds of cherries bringing the remarkable price of \$70.

These shipments marked the beginning of California's fruit season. Carload shipments from Sacramento valley districts have begun. The fruit crop of California will probably be slightly below average in quantity this year. The Sacramento valley fruit districts, which provide the bulk of California's deciduous fruits, report heavy crops of pears, but slight shortage in most other fruits. Apricots will begin ripening within a few days.
