on the most unpromising land. It has been educated and acclimated to dry land and grows abundantly in Southern Idaho, where there is but five inches of rainfall per year. In the driest regions of that state, it makes 2½ tons per acre each cutting, and two and three cuttings per year. "It is growing in Idaho at an elevation of 6500 feet and is the coming forage crop of this entire dry region of the Inland Empire. "One thing you may rely upon as being certain, and that is that wherever a heavy crop of native bunchgrass or other vegetation once grew on the idle land, that domesticated grasses will flourish there." A synopsis of Prof. C. L. Smith's able address will be given tomorrow.
