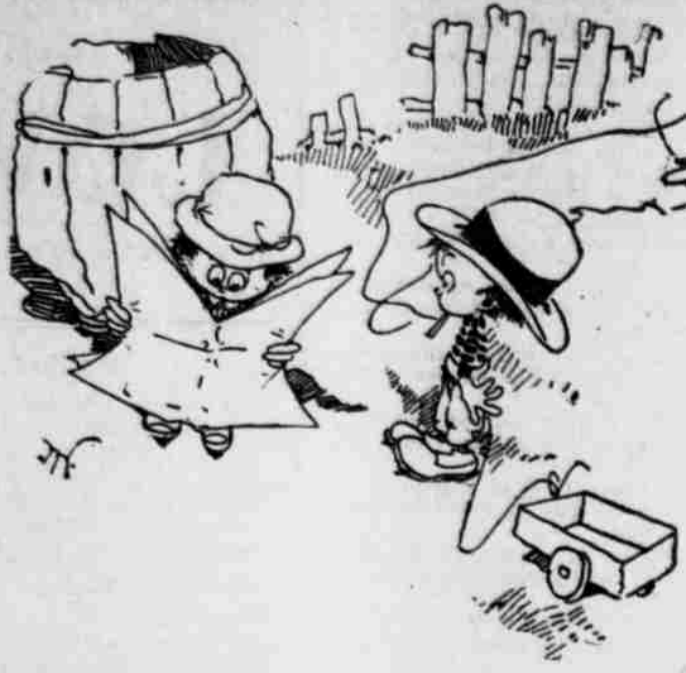

FEED IN THE INTERIOR.

Crook County Man Writes of Alfalfa in Central Oregon.

A Crook county correspondent, writing to the Pacific Homestead on alfalfa growing in Central Oregon, says:

For years the greatest drawback to the average stockman in Wasco, Crook and other inland counties, has been a shortage of feed for winter. During the spring and summer the average herd increases from 40 to 70 per cent. When the winter comes on, the rancher is compelled to sell regardless of price.

Last fall this condition became known at the stock yards and among the buyers resulting in a combine which finally resulted in a drop from 4½ to 2½, or approximately one-half of what the regular price paid should have been. Some sold, others held their stock over.

Those who were so fortunate as to have a liberal supply of feed on hand brought their herds through in good condition; but the less fortunate ones who depended wholly on the gift of nature (the outrage) for their stock, lost heavily. Some herds died off in countless numbers, the balance coming out in the spring in a condition almost equal to death itself.

This pool on the part of the buyers, together with the heavy loss from starvation and exposure, has taught the stockman a lesson long to be remembered. Alfalfa is the only source of relief. Hundreds of acres of bottom and irrigated land is being put out in alfalfa.

Some dry-land alfalfa has been sown. By means of this extra supply of hay and also feed the stockman is saved. He will not be dependent on the stockyards or buyer in the fall but instead, will have an abundant supply of the best feed on which to winter his stock, thus turning them out on the range in the spring in a substantial condition, better for breeding and better for the early market.

Diversity of feed and more of it is the coming necessity of the successful stockman. Better feeding means better breeding, and better breeding means better prices.

Mellman's Scheme.

At the city council meeting last night Heinrich Mellman asked the council to grant him another franchise for a street railway and also a franchise for the purpose of maintaining and conducting a general electric light and power plant in the city of Walla Walla, says the Walla Walla Statesman.

Both propositions were in the shape of ordinances which had been prepared by Mellman's attorneys. They were read the second time and then referred to the judiciary committee with instructions to bring in a report at the next meeting of the council, which will be held Tuesday night, May 31.

Staatsverband Convention.

Rochester, N. Y., May 28.—More than 500 delegates are already in the city for the ninth annual convention of the New York State Federation of German Catholic societies, or Staatsverband, which will be in session here during the next two days. There are more than 100 local societies in the state and all of them are expected to be represented by from two to a dozen delegates.

REMOVES LOWER JAW.

Strange Surgical Operation Performed at Seattle.

Seattle, May 28.—The entire lower jaw was removed from Louis Usanza, a cook, at the Seattle general hospital yesterday noon.

The operation, performed by Dr. F. B. Whiting, was made necessary from the fact that necrosis had set in, following the extraction of a tooth by a local dentist, and the entire jaw was rotting.

Usanza stood the operation well, but has ahead of him a long and tedious recovery. Eventually, physicians and surgeons agree, a hard substance resembling bone will granulate in and give Usanza a jaw bone.

The operation made it necessary to re-arrange the bones which granulate in and portion of the face. For the present Usanza is neither able to eat nor speak. He will recover speech as soon as the wounds made by the operation heal, but must be fed for some time in an artificial manner.

A number of prominent physicians witnessed the operation on Usanza. Necrosis, necessitating the removal of the jaw, is an extremely rare case, and the interest of the medical profession in the man was general. The operation was entirely successful.

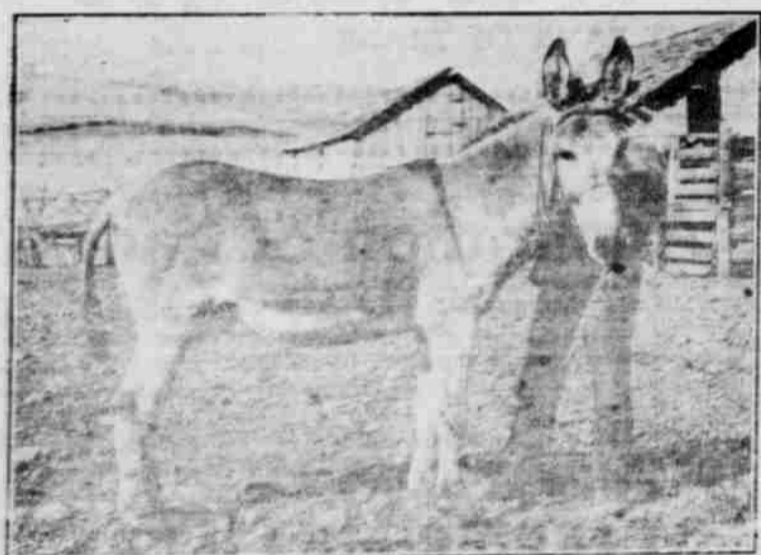
