West End Farmers Have Organized to Combat Disease.

Saturday afternoon the stockmen of Echo and vicinity, met for the purpose of effecting an organization of an association whose object it shall be to look after the condition of the stock in that particular district, take measures to eliminate the mange as far as is possible, and keep it out when once it is overcome.

The by-laws of the association have been prepared and drafted by Dr. John Christie, and were adopted by the Saturday meeting.

A committee consisting of R. N. Stanfield, Elton Spike, and Asa B. Thomson, was appointed to determine the boundaries of the district which shall be embraced in the new organization. They will make their report at the next meeting of the association. A committee to locate vats was also appointed.

### PICKLING PLANT BURNED.

Made a Tremendous Conflagration at Everett, Wash.

Everett, Wash., May 29.—The creosoted pile plant burned this morning. Loss, \$125,000. It was owned by P. F. Dundon, of San Francisco. Three thousand barrels of creosote burned and made flames that towered hundreds of feet in the air, visible many miles.
