DEMOCRATS AT HOLDMAN.

Last Rally Before the Weston "Political Day" Will Be Held at Holdman Friday.

A democratic rally has been arranged for Friday afternoon at 2 p. m. at which all the candidates are expected to be present.

The meeting will be held at the Holdman school house and the voters are looking forward to the rally as one of the biggest in that portion of the county during the campaign.

Doc Campbell, the veteran democratic warhorse of that precinct, has had the matter in charge and looks for a large attendance. There are 103 voters in Holdman precinct and 100 of these are registered, showing that great interest is taken in the campaign.
