### STOCK SHIPMENTS ACTIVE.

**Observations by Dr. Hutchinson, of the Animal Bureau.**

Dr. E. N. Hutchinson, of the bureau of animal industry, is in town for a visit of a few days on business connected with the department.

## ON COURT STREET

### BIG MONEY TO BE SPENT THEREON THIS SUMMER.

**Four Solid and Good Looking Brick Buildings Will Be Erected During the Next Few Weeks—This Necessitates Several Removals and Many Alterations—Active Operations Begin Tomorrow Morning.**

Things are moving on Court street these days. This morning Carl Weiser, the harness maker, moved his stock into his new store building on the corner of Court and Cottonwood, and will be ready for business by the time business is ready tomorrow morning.

The Standard Grocery Co. will move into the room formerly occupied by the Weiser harness shop in the La Dow block in the morning, and will remain there until their new building is completed about the first of August.

Tomorrow morning Messrs. O'Gara & Barnhart, the proprietors of the Standard grocery, will commence to tear down their old building on the corner of Court and Johnson and will be ready to begin the excavation for their new building by Monday next. It will be one story in height, and will have a 38-foot front and 85-foot depth. It will cost approximately \$7,000.

J. C. Spooner will move into the room formerly occupied by the meat market in the new Milarkey building on Court street. He will leave his old place of business by the first of the month, and as soon as he is out G. A. Robbins, of the Owl Tea House will begin to tear out the old shack now standing there, and will commence the erection of his new brick at once. It will be about the same style of building as the Standard Grocery Company building and will be finished by the middle of the summer.

Monday next V. Stroble will begin the excavation for a new brick to be built on the lot just to the east of the new Weiser building. It will also be a one-story house, 25x90 feet in dimensions and will be used as a store by Mr. Stroble, who will have to vacate the Wheeler building, which has been bought by the Eagles.

John Siebert, the tailor, is also contemplating the construction of a building on the one remaining lot in the block between the proposed Stroble building and the old Wheeler house. This will be in harmony with the other new buildings in the block and will cost about the same.

When all the buildings are up it will make a solid block of brick where all of the old wooden shacks now stand, and if the plans of the various men are carried out the buildings will all be completed and occupied by the end of this year.

### FOR COUNTY RECORDER.

**W. H. Fowler Finds His Prospects Very Bright.**

W. H. Fowler, the popular democratic candidate for county recorder, has just returned from a trip to the northern and eastern portions of the county and feels more confident than ever of success. He has made many friends by his able services, affable disposition as deputy in the offices of county clerk, recorder and sheriff.

Nearly every taxpayer in the county has met and dealt with Harry Fowler, during his long service in these offices, and he needs no introduction to the voters in the county. Mr. Fowler is an old-time conductor on the O. R. & N., running between Portland and Pendleton for some time and his railroad friends have not forgotten his jovial and accommodating disposition.

Because of his wide experience in all the county offices, Mr. Fowler is peculiarly fitted for the office of recorder, and will discharge the duties of this place with credit to Umatilla county.

**Woolbuyers Leave for That Place on Midnight Train.**

The woolbuyers who have been making their headquarters here for the season, will leave on the midnight train tonight for The Dalles, where they will take the branch out to Shaniko to attend the wool sales there the last of the week.
