NO SPECULATION

IRONCLAD LAND CONTRACTS AT IRRIGON.

Specimen of the Rigid Rules Enforced by F. B. Holbrook in His Land Speculations in Morrow County—Extract From Address of F. H. Newell Against Land and Water Speculation—Holbrook's Irrigation Bond Law Not Wanted in Oregon.

The voters of Umatilla county may be interested in knowing something of the ironclad contracts under which water is sold at Irrigon by F. B. Holbrook, the land and water speculator.

After charging from \$100 to \$150 per acre for this raw land, the company imposes the most unjust restrictions upon the purchasers, the following extracts from the land contracts being fair specimens.

Among other things the contract says:

Section 3. "The irrigation company may at its option place and maintain at the point of delivery suitable measuring boxes or gates; the time and manner of delivering, measuring and regulating the supply to the purchaser shall be prescribed by the irrigation company, and shall be under its control and subject to such rules and regulations as it may from time to time adopt; the irrigation company may shut off the water in the canals at any time that it may deem necessary to do so for repairs; and the purchaser for himself or his heirs and assigns agrees to waive and hereby does waive any and all claims for loss or damage resulting either from an insufficient or excessive supply of water, or from break, leakage or overflow of any canal, main or lateral, regardless of the cause thereof."

After signing away all common rights in the above clause, the purchaser is required to surrender still further rights that should remain forever with every free man, in the following ironclad section of the contract:

Sec. 5. "The purchaser will not use or permit the water hereunder furnished to be used on any land except that described above, nor permit such water to run off on any contiguous land, except in surface canals as herein provided, nor to spread out in low places on said land, nor in any manner to run to useless waste, and will construct and maintain at his own cost and expense such canals as may be necessary to carry any surplus of said water by gravity flow to such point as the irrigation company may designate, within a distance of six hundred and fifty feet from said land. Provided, that at all times when the said lands shall have been sufficiently irrigated and the rules and regulations of the irrigation company may require such action, it may shut off all of said water."

Mr. Holbrook has said that he would ask for a law permitting companies to bond water rights and sell for speculative purposes, thus placing the screams of the country in the hands of foreign capitalists and placing the settlers who may be driven to settle on these private holdings under such restrictions as the above, perpetually.

Mr. Newell said in his address before the Ogden Irrigation Congress, regarding speculation in irrigated lands and water rights: "Our efforts are centered on getting the land into the hands of men who will live there and cultivate it. We are studying carefully every scheme of the land speculator, so we will be able to forestall it. We must guard this as a sacred trust, and see that the actual, needy homesteader gets the benefit of the government's wise effects."

ENJOIN COPPER COMPANY.

Fruit Raisers Allege Damage to Their Property From Ejecta.
 Redding, Cal., May 31.—The United States government has begun a suit to enjoin the Mountain Copper Company from ejecting smoke from their roasters' and smelters' ground that injures fruit trees. The orchardists complained, and the suit resulted. Testimony is now being taken. If the injunction is granted, California's biggest copper smelter will be closed down indefinitely.

ANOTHER DEADLOCK.

Illinois Republicans Reconvene and Resume Balloting.
 Springfield, May 31.—When the convention assembled Speaker Cannon immediately ordered the roll call on the 59th ballot; Yates, 487; Lowden, 396; Deneed, 383; Hamlin, 116; Warner, 41; Sherman, 50; Pierce, 25. There was no change whatever on the 60th and 61st ballot.
