

RAILROADS HELPING

SHIPPING FACILITIES ARE RAPIDLY IMPROVING.

Committee Appointed by Livestock Association Reports on Progress of Negotiations—Companies Are Gradually Conceding All the Stockmen Ask—Pass Privilege Restored as a Result of the Committee.

The Livestock Association has issued the following circular showing the progress of negotiations with the railroad companies, looking toward better transportation facilities.

Speaking of the tonnage system of freight hauling on roads, the circular says:

"It takes time for railway companies to inaugurate entirely new methods of transportation over thousands of miles of line. However, their promise made to the committee of the National Livestock Association at the Chicago conference to abrogate the tonnage system in hauling livestock is being realized. It cannot be expected that small shipments of less than ten cars shall demand a 'special' service, or that a reasonable number of cars of dead freight shall not make up the balance of the train.

"The principal demand of the shippers is promptness in furnishing cars, and better time on the way to market. Reports from nearly every western state is to the effect that the service has wonderfully improved, and that the railroads are honestly endeavoring to give satisfaction. Advice from all the eastern markets are that the service in time and prompt delivery is now better than it has been at any time for several years past.

"President F. J. Hagenbarth has addressed a letter to Chairman Mahoney of the Trunk line committee, in which he offers to meet with the presidents or traffic managers of stock-carrying roads at any time, for the purpose of amicably and justly settling any differences which may arise between the stockmen and transportation companies.

"We ask that any shipper experiencing uncalled for delay report the same to this office, that we may have it on file for any future emergency that may arise.

"The return pass privilege has been restored to stockmen through this committee.

Interstate Commerce.

"If it is possible to get the interstate commerce act amended as provided for in the Quarles-Cooper bill, the troubles of the shippers of livestock will be minimized. The National Livestock Association, for four years, has been aiding the interstate com-

merce law convention to secure the enactment of this amendment. The bill is perfectly satisfactory to all our people, and is now before the committees on interstate commerce of both houses, ready to be reported out on the reconvening of congress in December.

"You are urgently requested to write your members of congress and senators, demanding that they give this matter their attention, and if possible, have resolutions adopted and sent to the speaker of the house, president of the senate, and to Hon. W. P. Hepburn, chairman of the house committee on interstate and foreign commerce, and Hon. S. B. Elkins, chairman of the senate committee on interstate and foreign commerce, requesting early action on the bill."

THE INVENTOR ROBBED.

Widow Now Sues Standard Oil Company for Royalties Due Her Husband.

Fifty million dollars is claimed by Elizabeth T. Greenbough, of New York, widow of the famous inventor, Benjamin F. Greenbough, in a suit against Henry H. Rogers, of the Standard Oil company, and the executors of Charles Pratt, once Mr. Rogers' partner.

The action has been commenced in the Massachusetts superior court, and summons have been sent to Mr. Rogers and the Pratt executors.

Mrs. Greenbough's claim is based on the invention by her husband of a process of oil-refining which renders kerosene non-explosive, and she alleges that she is entitled to a royalty of one-quarter of a cent a gallon on all oil so treated by the Standard Oil company.

In 1874, when Rogers and Pratt were young and poor in the oil business Greenbough invented this process, and sold it to them under a contract guaranteeing him the royalty mentioned. Within a few years Greenbough had received more than \$500,000 in royalties from the Standard Oil company, to which Rogers and Pratt had transmitted the invention.

Then Greenbough was lost at sea and his widow, having no knowledge of the contract with her husband,

made no claim for royalties. The Standard Oil company also apparently forgot it.

A short time ago Mrs. Greenbough found among her husband's papers a copy of the contract, and the suit is the result. Though begun against Rogers and the Pratt executors, the Standard Oil company is the real defendant.

Greenbough during the civil war compounded an explosive that proved so terrible that his wife begged him not to reveal its secret, and he never did.

Nebraska Democrats.
