FOUR TONS OF HONEY.

R. E. Thom and James McCarty, of Butter Creek, Have About 200 Colonies of Bees Each.

R. E. Thom, of Echo, one of the most extensive honey producers in Eastern Oregon, is in the city today on business. Mr. Thom has over 200 colonies of bees on his Butter creek ranch, and makes a business of producing honey for market. James McCarty, also of Butter creek, is another heavy bee raiser and Mr. Thom and Mr. McCarty will each market about four tons of honey this season.

The first of the crop will be ready for market about July 15 and the last will be sent out about September 15. The honey produced by these men is all sweet clover honey and is marketed readily in Pendleton and Portland at good prices, as it is a choice article.

Nearly all the farmers in the Butter creek district have a few stands of bees, but few of them raise honey extensively, as it requires special preparations for the work and special care during the honey making season. Echo is especially adapted to producing an excellent grade of honey.
