FOR WORLD PEACE

INTERNATIONAL MEETING AT LAKE MAHONK, NEW YORK.

Is the Tenth Annual Conference—Has a Distinguished Membership—Will Discuss a Proposed Anglo-American Treaty, and Arbitration in All Its Phases—No Delegates Are Slated to Attend This Session From Foreign Countries.

Lake Mahonk, N. Y., June 1.—Drawn together by their common desire to see arbitration succeed war as a means of settling disputes between nations, some 200 men and women—educators, jurists, diplomats, statesmen and business men—have gathered here for the tenth annual conference on international arbitration. The visitors are the guests of Albert K. Smiley, a wealthy Quaker, who inaugurated the series of conferences 10 years ago, and who has devoted a great part of his time and fortune to the promotion of peace.

The conference which began today is unusually well attended and promises to attract more attention than any previous session. It is fortunate in having as its presiding officer Judge George Gray of Delaware, who is one of the four United States representatives on the bench of The Hague Tribunal, and whose experience as a member of the Paris Peace commission of 1898, the Anthracite Strike commission of 1902, and other important arbitral bodies has given him a wide and varied knowledge of arbitral procedure.

Other notable men who will be heard during the three days' session are Judge William L. Penfield, of the state department at Washington, who will speak on the Venezuelan case at The Hague court; Commissioner McFarland, of the District of Columbia, who is down for an address on the significance of the present agitation in favor of an arbitration treaty with Great Britain, and Charles M. Pepper, special commissioner appointed by the government on the Pan-American railway project, who will speak on the relations of the western hemisphere.

These three men are among those who have prepared set addresses, but there are many other men who are expected to take a part in the conference discussions. Among the number are Don M. Dickinson of Michigan; Professors John Bassett Moore and James Brown Scott of Columbia University, Assistant Secretary of State Francis B. Loomis, Justice David J. Brewer of the United States supreme court, General Stewart L. Woodford, President Warfield of Lafayette college, General O. O. Howard, Edward Everett Hale, Judge Charles H. Elliot of Minneapolis, Congressman Geo. W. Smith of Illinois, Congressman C. E. Littlefield of Maine, Congressman Robert F. Broussard of Louisiana, and Congressman T. E. Burton of Ohio.

One session of the conference will be given up to a discussion of the proposed Anglo-American arbitration treaty, and another to the consideration of arbitration from a business point of view.

CHICAGO CONVENTION.

Sub-Committees Are Arranging the Last Details.

Chicago, Ill., June 1.—The members of the sub-committee of the republican national committee rounded up here today to give further consideration to the arrangements for the republican national convention which will meet in Chicago three weeks hence.

After looking over the arrangements made by the local entertainment committee, inspecting the seating arrangements in the Coliseum and the plans for the disposition of tickets for delegates, alternates, press reporters and the general public, the sub-committee will adjourn to meet again June 15, to complete all arrangements. Members of the sub-committee attending the meeting are Secretary Elmer Dover of Cleveland, O.; Senator Scott, of West Virginia, who is chairman; Harry S. New of Indianapolis, and R. B. Schneider of Fremont, Neb.

Justice Harlan is 71.

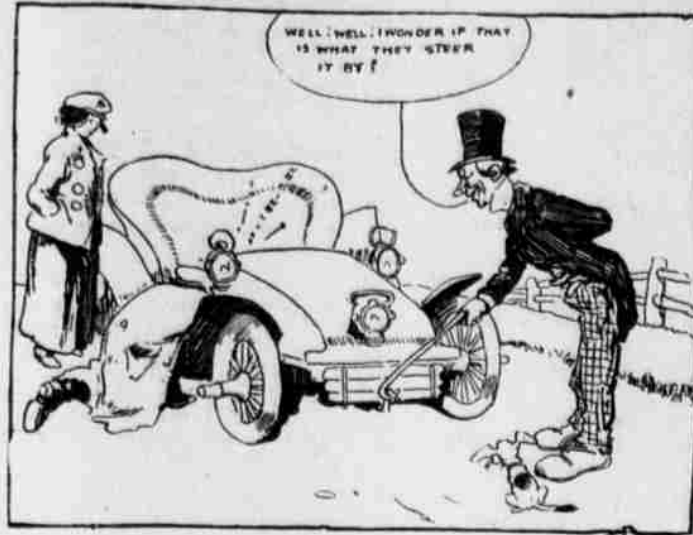

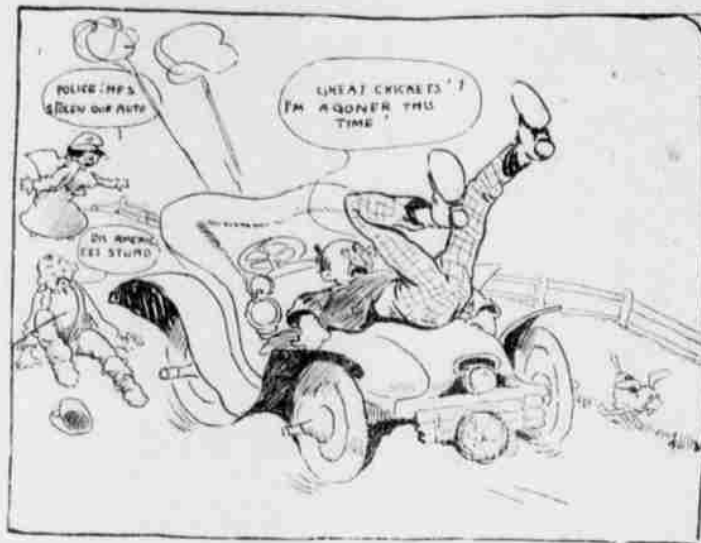

GAVE HIS OWN LIFE TO HELP OTHERS

The history of the Molokai leper settlement is a history of religious heroism. From a place of wretched squalor, filth and disorder it has been changed to a clean, sanitary, well-cared for government charge, and its occupants, instead of huddling miserably together, houseless and homeless, under the trees to await the decaying of their bodies, have been taught to take pride in individual homes, to beautify their dooryards and to interest themselves in the affairs of a local government which has been established along the same lines as those followed in ordinary settlements or municipalities.

Church spies pointing through the green of the trees and the musical sound of church bells at vespers bespeak the influence that has wrought this change; and a white monument in the leper cemetery, rising from a grave that by loving hands is freshly strewn with flowers, tells the simple story of the man who gave his life work and died a leper that the change might be brought about. The stone marks the last resting place of Father Joseph Damien, "The Leper Priest." Father Damien was educated in

Belgium. At the age of 19 he volunteered to take the place of a brother priest who had been appointed to missionary work in the South Seas, and against the protest of all the brotherhood he set out for the savage islands.

For 10 years he toiled among the natives of the various South Sea islands. Then one day he heard the bishop complain of not having any priests to send to Molokai, and he begged to be allowed to go. A few days later he embarked on a cattle boat for the exile island, from which he was never to return.

A brother priest describes Father Damien standing in the prow of the boat as it pulled out, "a figure of splendid physique, strong and robust, an excellent specimen of a man, with that in his face which marked him as of brave spirit and as noble a soul." When Father Damien landed at Molokai prison he found the lepers assembled "from all the islands, hundreds of them, exiled to the little story of the man who gave his life work and died a leper that the change might be brought about.
