SACAJAWEA'S NAME.

Dr. Washington Matthews of Washington Gives Correct Pronunciation. Portland, June 2.—(To the Editor.)—Kindly inform me what is the correct way to pronounce the name of Sacajawea.—Reader. Correct spelling, Tsakakawea; correct pronunciation, Tsa-ka-ha-wea, with accent on second syllable. Incorrect spelling used by Lewis and Clark, Sacajawea, with accent on the last syllable. In the March issue of the Lewis and Clark Journal is an item concerning Dr. Washington Matthews, of the United States bureau of ethnology: "Dr. Washington Matthews, the well known ethnologist of Washington, D. C., etc., etc., is the highest living authority on the Indian tribe (Minnetarees), into which the Bird woman was adopted when a child. He lived among these Indians eight years, and compiled a grammar and dictionary of their language, the Hidatsa. The spelling 'Sacajawea,' which Dr. Matthews condemns, is that of Lewis and Clark. 'This Indian name of 'Bird woman' came to them through the Canadian-French of Charbonneau, her husband, and the error has been so widely adopted that it would now be impossible to correct the spelling and pronunciation without causing endless confusion in the popular mind concerning the identity of the 'Bird woman.' Club women use the Lewis spelling, Sacajawea, accent on last syllable.

Gen. Miles Must Declare Himself Before it is Tendered. Chicago, June 2.—National Prohibition Chairman Stewart in a statement today concerning Gen. Miles' position, says Miles would undoubtedly be nominated by the prohibitionists for the presidency if it were known he was really identified with the party and should openly state the fact, but since he is not willing to make such a statement, the prohibitionists must look elsewhere.

Expensive Target.

Target practice is obviously a subject upon which most nations are silent as to details, and, therefore, very little has been made public concerning a most remarkable target practice held by order of the French government off Toulon. The turret of the battleship Suffren was subjected to the fire of two shots from a 9.2 inch gun of the Massena. A battleship in commission fully manned and equipped, representing millions of dollars, was thus deliberately made a target for another ship. The idea was to ascertain what would be the effect of impact of shots upon the turret of a modern battleship. The range was short in order to minimize the possibility of not hitting the turret, and the turret was covered with additional plating so that there was no risk of penetration. The report of this test was not given out.—The World's Work.
