### GENERAL NEWS.

An explosion in the B. F. Goodrich handle works at Akron, O., seriously injured half a dozen people.

Car thieves in Chicago are said to cost the railroads centering there over \$1,000,000 since the World's Fair.

Recorder Goff, of New York, has sentenced to nine years and six months, John Crane and Arthur Nagle, for robbing a woman of 30 cents.

James Gayley, vice-president of the United States Steel Corporation, has invented a process that greatly cheapens the cost of production of pig iron and Bessemer steel.

The almost completely incinerated remains of an unknown man were found Decoration Day in a marsh 19 miles south of Philadelphia. There were evidences of murder and cremation with coal oil.

Michael Donovan is under arrest in Chicago. He ran a "fence" for many years and it is believed his trial and conviction will lead to breaking up the largest gang of car thieves that has ever infested Chicago.

Experts believe that every edible state grown can be produced in profusion and perfection on the deserts of Arizona and Southern California. An extensive experiment station has been started at Mecca, on the Colorado desert, to test the theory.

The retail prices of lumber of all grades have been reduced 10 per cent at Astoria.

Mrs. Sarah M. Kern, an Oregon pioneer of 1847, died at Portland Thursday, aged 61.

The salaries of the Oregon City teachers have been increased 5 per cent for the coming term.

Tacoma is infested with a scourge of caterpillars which are stripping the foliage from trees and shrubs.

The direct primary amendment and local option are the two leading issues in all Oregon counties this year.

All the stock has been subscribed to the Joseph and Innaha telephone line and the wire will be strung at once.

Louis Grant was drowned at South Bend, Wash., Thursday, by falling out of a small boat while rowing on the Columbia.

North Yakima Commercial Association will macadamize several short pieces of country road leading into that city this summer.

Isaac Butler, an aged pioneer of Hillsboro, died Thursday. He was a soldier in the Cayuse war, having come to Oregon from Missouri in 1845.

There are now 31 entries in the pacing race for the next state fair, and other races are being well patronized also. The purse for the pacing race is \$2,000.

Thirty-one students of the Oregon Agricultural College have just visited all the large stock farms of Willamette valley for the purpose of studying farm methods.

New quarters for the bachelor officers have just been completed at Vancouver barracks at a cost of \$25,000. A new gymnasium will be built at a cost of \$22,000.

## UNDER TWO FLAGS

LOCAL TALENT PRESENTS  
THE DRAMA VERY ABLY.

Careful Training Was Shown in All the Parts—Natural Ability Exhibited and Many Complimentary Remarks From a Representative Audience—Eastern Star to Be Congratulated, and the Entire Cast Heartily Praised by Theatergoers.

Not all the dramatic artists are traveling in that business. Pendleton has a few in reserve who acquit themselves like veterans when occasion demands.

The amateur dramatic entertainment at the Frazer last night, in which the thrilling drama, "Under Two Flags," was presented by a local company under the direction of W. Edgar Graham in the interest of the Order of Eastern Star, was evidence that with proper direction and training Pendleton can give a high-class theatrical performance within herself.

The Frazer was crowded with a highly representative audience to witness the play, and it was well rewarded by seeing this old story produced by Pendleton people in a stirring manner.

The leading role was taken by Mr. Graham, who is an actor of high order, and his keen conception of the play added to his natural ability, gave the production much of its spirit. But Graham was not alone in giving spirit and vim to the play. Miss Edith Crockett, C. J. Ferguson, R. A. Watson, Win Stewart, Mrs. Castleman, Mrs. McMinn, Miss Whittemore, Pauline Mims, Dr. Kern and Miss Stanfield, and, in fact, everyone in the cast did exceptionally well, and the entire production was much better than many professional performances that have been greeted with enthusiastic houses in Pendleton.

The production showed careful training and much patience in details and the performance was carried out without a serious hitch.

Mrs. McMinn as Cigarette, and Miss Crockett in her part, did exceptionally well, and deserve special mention, as they were in the most difficult roles, while all those in minor roles showed earnest study of the parts and ability in presenting them.

A thrill of enthusiasm ran through the audience as Charley Ferguson swelled up in the last act and said that the bullets of the firing squad should pass through his body before touching his wronged friend, Bertie Cecil, condemned to death.

As a smooth, insinuating Jew in the part of Baron, Ralph Watson out-Shylocked Shylock, and made a hit in the first act. But as a villain Watson was fierce. The grouchy scowl on the face of a bulldog would look like an angel's smile, compared to the terrifying visage of Watson as Colonel Chateaufort, the villain.

One of the treats of the evening was the singing of Miss Kinsella, who favored the audience with a vocal selection, and who heartily responded to two encores. She has a voice of peculiar sweetness and power. The comedy acts of Fred Hartman and Sol Baum were well received and the entire performance was carried out with a vigorous dash, that told of the work of an artist in the direction as well as in the acting.
