EXTRAORDINARY CASE REPORTED FROM ATHENA.

Mrs. Alex McKenzie, Believing Her Husband Killed in an Accident, Sustained a Heart Shock Which Caused Her Death Shortly After-The Deceased and Her Husband Among the Highly Respected Old Settlers.

Mrs. Alex McKenzie, prominent farmer of Adams, was trightened to death yesterday afternoon while riding with her husband, a short distance from Athena.

While driving along the road the team became frightened at a hole that had been dug by the side of the road, and started to run. The lurch they gave the buggy in shying threw Mr. McKenzie out of the rig, where he lay for several minutes. where he lay for several minutes, Mrs. McKenzie succeeded in stopping the horses in a short distance, and drove back to the place where they started to run. Mr. McKinzie had in the meantime recovered from his fall and got into the rig and started to drive on

His wife, after the danger was over, collapsed and died in a short time from heart trouble induced by the great excitement due to her danger and the belief that her husband had been killed.

Mr. McKenzie seeing his wife's se rious illness, drove as fast as possi-ble to Athena, where he sought medical aid, but she was dead by the time

he reached that place.

The deceased was past middle life and has lived with her husband on the farm near Adams over 20 years. The husband is a prominent Mason and that order has taken charge.
