AGAINST LOCAL OPTION.

Liquor Dealers Object to Statements Made by Temperance People.

The liquor dealers have asked space for the following circular letter on the local option question:

The act is clearly prohibition pure and simple, so much so that even those papers which formerly voiced the passage of local option in many editorials, are silent as death from an editorial standpoint.

Again, Mr. Voter, look at this from a business side, ask the brightest business men in your vicinity his opinion as to this act. If you do not want to do this, look around you and see how many of the best business men are on the prohibition side.

Mr. Voter, if you find that the prohibitions are not generally large taxpayers, do not as a rule build brick houses or increase the county or state wealth, would it be wise business policy to let them have the molding of your business laws? However good their intentions may be, Mr. Voter, if they are not a success as to their own position, would you deem it wise to trust them with the helm of affairs.

We could fill a book with letters, etc., of condemnation as to the effects of similar acts, for instance the cashier of the First National Bank at Sulphur Springs, Texas, writing on May 21st, 1902, in summing up says: "I look upon local option in this city as an unmitigated curse." Now, Mr. Voter, if the cashiers of the Pendleton banks were to so express themselves, would you not deem it a pretty good business opinion?

A. B. Robertson, president of the Colorado National Bank of Colorado, says: "The rankest local optionist in the town would, I believe, bear me out in the statement that local option has caused this town to lose a great deal of trade."

Ask such men as these in your locality, their opinions, not to spread abroad, but for your private information. Ask them if in their opinion, the heavy taxpayers will vote for local option. Ask them if a property qualification were required, what chance would the act have in their opinion.

Mr. Voter, the liquor dealer will not be hit any harder, probably not as hard pro rata as the man who has built your brick blocks or otherwise improved your county and state. Self-preservation is the first law of nature of course, but don't think that our object is altogether sordid. We believe what we say, and as a class we are willing to place our improvements or our charities side by side with an equal number of those who would obliterate us, whatever the place or state may be.

Mr. Voter, we ask for your franchise Monday in that we think our position right. We ask you not as the friend of liquor or any other interests, but as the friend of liberty.
