GENERAL NEWS.

A fire in the Hackberry mine at Big Butte, Ariz., smothered and burned nine men to death.

James Gaylor Brown, a well known turfman, is under arrest charged with embezzling \$25,000 from his father's estate.

Peter G. Meredith, aged 94 years, and Miss Clodia Logsdon, aged 17 years, were lately married at Frankfort, Ky.

French military experts have no hope of Port Arthur being able to hold out many more weeks against the Japs.

King Edward's coffemaker is a Turk who does nothing else, and receives \$3,000 per year and valuable perquisites for his services.

At Fairfax Court House, Va., was lately unveiled a monument to John Quincy Marr, the first Confederate soldier killed in the civil war.

The Protestant Episcopal church of which Mayor McLane, of Baltimore, who suicided, was a member, denied him a funeral and burial from that church.

At Bad Axe, Mich., during the annual high school athletic meet, a hammer flew from the hands of a contestant, struck A. Frost, a boy, on the head and killed him.
