### GENERAL NEWS.

A strike of 16,000 rockmen and excavators in and near New York City will take place if a raise of wages is not granted.

Mrs. A. M. Woodward, wife of the president of the Minneapolis South Side Bank, had three of her cervical vertebrae broken by a folding bed shutting up on her.

F. W. Horner, a widely known business man of Los Angeles, was drowned in the surf near that place while bathing. Supposed to be a case of cramps, or of muscular failure.

Sing Weng, a Chinese laundryman in New York, stabbed a white woman, a lewd character, to death in his laundry. The utmost endeavors of the police were necessary to keep Wing Seng from being lynched.

Charles F. Large, a San Francisco drug clerk, is under arrest charged with selling John McCann carbolic acid purposely when he ordered something else for an immediate dose. McCann swallowed the acid and died.

The city government of Lexington, Ky., has ordered that all supplies for the city for the next two years be purchased labor union made when possible; machinery, blank books, paints, oils, etc., and that only union labor be employed.

The real reason for the withdrawal of several large benefactors to California institutions by Mrs. Phoebe Hearst, is declared to be pique at the rough treatment her son received in the recent state democratic convention. J. Sullivan, a well-known jockey, was found wandering in the woods near Kalama, Monday, insane.

Seth W. Brace, a farmer living near Union, was killed in a runaway accident at Union Sunday morning.

The Mormon Women's clubs have withdrawn from the general federation because of some resolutions passed reflecting on Mormonism.

Susie and Lena Zennan, of Seattle, have been lured away from home by a gambler giving the name of F. E. Smith.

Charles Jones, of The Dalles, is still alive, although the top of his skull is blown off as a result of an attempt at suicide.

Construction on the Sumpter Valley railroad extension will be pushed into the Prairie City and John Day country, this season.

Burglars robbed the Orion saloon in Spokane, Monday morning, at daylight, carrying off the cash register, which was found broken open in a vacant lot later.

Raymond Fulton, a 10-year-old boy, was drowned in the Port Neuf river at Pocatello, Monday, while playing in a small boat. His little sister escaped.

The body of a big baby boy, two days old, was found at the entrance of Volunteer Park, Seattle, Monday morning. It had died from neglect as its appearance shows.

## IN PIONEER DAYS

I. H. STONEBRAKER SETTLED IN PENDLETON 44 YEARS AGO.

Plowed Up the Field Now Known as the Rugg Place and Raised First Crop in the Town—Jerome Stonebraker Born April 26, 1861, First White Child Born in Pendleton—Raised 90 Bushels of Oats Per Acre in Streets of Weston.

I. H. Stonebraker of McKay creek, who has resided in Umatilla county for the past 44 years, was in the city yesterday evening, and in conversation with the East Oregonian, recounted some interesting history of this city and county.

Mr. Stonebraker arrived on the present site of the city of Pendleton on August 2, 1860, and lived in a log hut on the north bank of the Umatilla river, just below the Main street bridge, that winter. His son, Jerome Stonebraker, was born on April 26, 1861, and was the first white child born in the city limits of the present city of Pendleton.

When Mr. Stonebraker arrived here the Cayuses and Umatilla Indians were using the present site of the city as a lot in which to break their ponies to ride.

The ground at that time was covered with smooth stones from the river bed. The Indians would round up the ponies on the present site of Main street and catch the wildest ones, and ride them on the rock piles in the old river bed, as the smooth stones soon tired the horses and they would make but a few jumps before giving up and becoming docile.

In the spring of 1861 Mr. Stonebraker plowed up the flat now occupied by the Rugg place above the railroad bridges and planted the first crop ever sown in Pendleton. He removed to a place now occupied by the town of Weston, and raised a crop of oats in 1861, on the present site of Weston, which yielded 90 bushels per acre.

He has resided in Umatilla county all these years, except a few months in California, and would live nowhere else. He is over 70 years of age, and is hale and hearty yet. He came from Page county, Iowa, to Umatilla county with ox teams, and his first money earned in this city was by making ox yokes from balm trees, for the freighters.

At that time the price of a rough yoke in The Dalles was \$8, and as Mr. Stonebraker could make fair wages at the business he charged but \$2 per yoke, and made three a day, besides helping clear off a garden spot and do other work. He made 80 yokes at that price, before supplying his trade. He also kept the stage station here in a building on the present site of the Hotel Pendleton.

### KILLED ON THE TRACK.

A. M. Bryan of Cree, Colorado, Struck by Train Near Durkee.

Coroner Snow returned yesterday from Durkee and stated that in the inquest over the remains of the man found dead on the O. R. & N. tracks near that point it later developed from articles found on his person that his name was A. M. Bryan of Creed, Colorado, says the Baker City Democrat.

A paid road tax bill reading to that name and dated Creed, Colorado, 1904, and half of an insurance receipt from the Home Insurance Company dated in March, 1904, were among the papers on his person.

The section foreman of the O. R. & N. testified that he saw the man go and sit down on the track shortly before the arrival of the train, and that after the train passed he found his dead body.

He noticed that the engineer whistled a signal just before coming to the point where the man was, but did not see anything further. It is presumed to be a case of suicide. The remains were brought to Baker City.

### Invaded by Caterpillars.

An invasion of caterpillars became so serious in Seattle last week that the park board sent out a small army of men to fight the pests. The state fruit inspector and his deputies also have been conducting a war upon the insects, and owners of fruit and shade trees also have been engaged in the fight.

The caterpillars are of the "tent" variety that prey upon foliage. They appeared simultaneously in Pierce and King counties upon fruit and shade trees. The state horticultural inspector and his deputies made the first onslaught and have had the support of the fruitgrowers in the crusade.

Ten years ago a similar invasion of caterpillars in Whatcom county destroyed the foliage on deciduous tree and shrub growth, the effect lasting for years. President Saunders of the city park board; State Horticultural Inspector Von Holderbeck and his deputies, Cass and Brown, are directing the fight.—Spokesman-Review.
