TELEPHONE AFFAIRS

TIME HAS ARRIVED FOR AN IMPROVED SERVICE.

Two Hundred and Fifty Patrons and Business Men Expected to Meet General Manager McGillevray Tonight at Commercial Association Parlors—It is Up to the People Now to Secure or Turn Down an Improved, Modern, Up-to-Date 'Phone System.

The meeting of the Commercial Association this evening promises to be one of the largest and most important that has been held for some time. It is expected and has been promised, that at least 250 business men and patrons of the telephone system will be in attendance to discuss the plans to be submitted to them by Manager McGillevray, of the Telephone Company, with a view to improving it.

Mr. McGillevray's visit is the result of the agitation on the part of the business men, and the co-operation of Miss Mousu, manager of the local office. He has a plan which he has explained to the patrons of the system wherever he has been able to meet with them, and which has met with the universal approval of all who have heard it.

If the people of this place wish to have the new service and will act in harmony with the company, the new agreements will be drawn up at once, and the company will put as large a force of men to work here as can be handled, and the new 'phones will be installed as fast as possible.

The new system will place the Pendleton service ahead of that of Spokane if it is adopted, and will give the city all the conveniences that can be secured in any telephone service on the coast.

The meeting will be called to order this evening at 8 o'clock, and it is desired that all those interested will be present and listen to the discussion, and take part in it.

Royal Neighbors' Meeting.

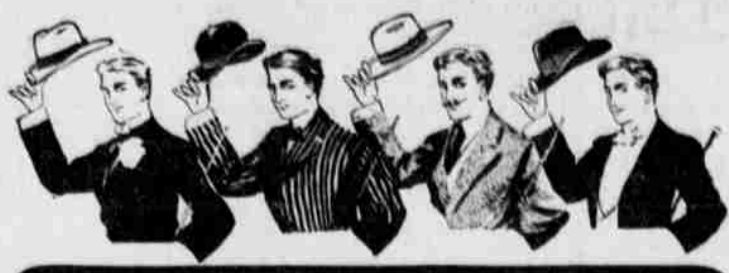
