## GENERAL NEWS.

The Brazilian-Peruvian boundary dispute has broken out again, and Brazil is sending troops to the frontier.

Mayor McLane, of Baltimore, by will left \$10,000 to his wife, whom he married three weeks before committing suicide.

The number of cases of pulmonary disease in New York City has reached the highest figure on record. The city health department alone has 1,000 in its direct charge.

A tolerable idea of the volume of shipping crossing the Columbia river can be formed from the fact that 16 licensed pilots are busy year in and year out guiding it.

Henry Watterson declares that the only reason he prefers Grover Cleveland for president over Roosevelt, is that the former, on account of his age, is less likely to live out his term.

The Japanese government has officially notified all commercial nations that it has Liao Tung peninsula (upon which is situated Port Arthur and Dalny) effectively and completely blockaded.

William Keyser, formerly vice president of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, dropped dead of heart failure, at the spectacle of a runaway team drawing a carriage containing four lady friends.

Upon the general principle that only dogs, cattle and other livestock can be justly taxed per capita, James Curtin, of Pittsfield, Mass., will fight the city poll tax clear into the United States supreme court.

The 5-year-old daughter of C. M. Pearing, of Caster, S. D., apparently died, was laid out, and lay 36 hours in her coffin. A neighbor refused to believe she was dead, and measures were taken to resuscitate the child, which regained consciousness and is convalescing rapidly.

## NORTHWEST NEWS.

Solomon Eads, aged 65, a pioneer of Eastern Oregon, died at La Grande, Tuesday.

James Wiggs, the crack pitcher of the Salt Lake baseball team, has been indefinitely suspended by the manager.

Alvin Lane, a 13-year-old boy, residing at Waterville, near Eugene, was dragged to death by a horse, Tuesday morning.

S. Rusk, an old pioneer miner of Eastern Oregon, dropped dead in Bourne, Monday, as he was going to the polls.

Oregon Homeopaths will meet in Portland in state convention on June 14 and 15, this being the 28th annual session of the organization.

The Pacific Coast lumber combine, including the big mills of Portland, has been declared illegal in the federal courts of San Francisco.

Fred Bohle, a farmer of Colton, Wash., died from blood poisoning Tuesday, as a result of a small cut on his thumb from a tomato can.

The headquarters of the American Labor Union will be removed from Butte, Mont., to Chicago, because of the more central location of the latter city.

State Food and Dairy Commissioner Bailey is hot on the trail of the importers of adulterated jellies from California, which have been scattered through Oregon markets in the past week.

# MEET FRIDAY NIGHT

OFFICIAL AND FINAL SELECTION OF SITES.

Little Doubt But That the Byers' Grove Site Will Be Selected, Mr. Byers Agreeing to the Necessary Conditions—Other Sites More a Matter of Doubt—Bonds Will Be Sold June 15—Miss Eva Wood Re-elected to Teach.

At the meeting of the school board held last evening no business was done of importance except the re-election of Miss Eva Wood as one of the teachers for next year. Miss Wood had charge of the third grade last year, and has made a specialty of that work, and will in all probability be given the same position during the next year.

No action was taken in reference to the selection of the sites for the new school buildings, the matter being deferred until a meeting to be held on Friday evening, when the location of the three new houses will be definitely determined upon. It was not stated positively by any member of the board, but the sentiment seems to be in favor of the Byers' Grove location, and of the Matlock property. Mr. Byers will, it is said, fill in and grade the grove, placing it on the level required by the city engineer, in which case the property will be a good location.

The Matlock property in the west end is now practically in shape, and is a good location, being central and in a good neighborhood.

On the north side the board has about decided upon a tract near the end of Jackson street, where a building can be put without being either too high up the hill, or too far from the central part of that neighborhood.

The locations will all be decided upon Friday evening, and plans arranged for the commencement of the construction work.

The bonds will be sold Wednesday, June 15, and from that time on the work of construction will be rushed.

## PAIRED IN BED.

Two Veteran Voters Unable to Reach the Polls.

To patriotic people either in jail or in bed, election day has no charm; but a couple of old-time residents of this place got around the difficulty in a strictly parliamentary manner.

Last week, while handling a young horse, A. D. Rhonimus had the misfortune to become tangled up with some harness, and had his leg broken close to the thigh. He was taken to the hospital, where his case is now progressing in a satisfactory manner, but when election day dawned the old pioneer wanted to vote, and asked the doctor attending him to send up a judge and clerk of election and take his ballot. This, of course, could not be done, and the old man was very much disappointed.

Mr. Rhonimus is a democrat, and though 74 years of age, takes great interest in the success of his party. The doctor told him that perhaps Jesse Failing could help him out. Mr. Failing is 75 years of age, and is laid up with a broken thigh. He is a republican. So the two gentlemen decided to pair. Neither voted and as each would have voted opposite tickets, the result will not be changed.

## ROAD TO SEVEN DEVILS.

Baker City Will Be Connected With Rich Copper Camp.

Baker City, Ore., June 8.—The long-expected railroad from here to the Seven Devils, a distance of 60 miles, now seems certain of construction this season by the promoters. W. L. Vinson, W. C. Brown, vice-president of the New York Central railroad and of the Lake Shore railroad, H. A. Parker, vice-president of the Rock Island road and James A. Drake, a wealthy New York banker, arrived last night at Huntington in Mr. Brown's private car and today are going over the route of the proposed road in company with Mr. Vinson.

W. J. Patterson, a large land owner and irrigationist of Baker City is also a guest of Mr. Vinson on this trip of inspection.

The proposed railroad will tap the rich Eagle and Pine valleys, Big Goose creek, Seven Devils copper mines, Medical Lake and Cornucopia gold mines. The building of the road means a tremendous increase of business here and the decision of these experts is anxiously awaited.

## TENNIS TOURNAMENT.

First Game Will Be Played Next Sunday—Terms in Detail.

At a meeting of the Tennis Club last evening, arrangements were completed for the coming tournament. It was decided that the first game would be played on Sunday morning next. At that time a schedule will be at the courts, and each member wishing to compete in the singles will be given a place.
