## CROPS ARE THRIVING

TIMELY RAINS VISIT ALL SECTIONS OF OREGON.

Ranges in Excellent Condition—Berries Plentiful and of the Best Quality—Caterpillars Visit Many Districts—No Chance for Damage to Crops Now—Alfalfa and Rye Are Being Harvested.

Following is the government crop report for the past week:

The rains during the fore part of the week were timely and very beneficial, but in the Willamette valley and a few other localities more rain is needed for late crops and meadows.

Fall wheat and barley are heading nicely, and the frosted wheat in Umatilla county is improving and will probably turn out better than expected. In Wasco county there are numerous complaints of weedy fields, but the fall grain crop as a whole is very promising. Spring wheat, barley and oats are doing well. The alfalfa harvest is progressing and rye is being cut for hay, the yields in both cases being above the average.

Ranges and stock are in excellent condition, and the flow of milk in the dairy districts continues good. Orchard grass, vetch and clover will be ready to cut in about 10 days. Hops, corn, potatoes and gardens have made good progress during the week. The hop yards apparently are free from vermin and the vines look promising.

Strawberries are plentiful and their quality is extra good. Cherries are ripening and while they have suffered considerable damage from frost and cold rains, the yield will be larger than expected earlier in the season. Italian prunes will be the lightest in years. Peaches promise fairly good returns, and apples are extra good. In the coast counties and in some portions of the Willamette valley caterpillars are more numerous than usual.

Columbia River Valley.

Victor, Wasco county, W. H. Talcott—Nice shower the 31st; winter wheat and barley heading; oats and spring wheat looking well; corn planting done and most of it up to a good stand; some fields of fall wheat very weedy; fruit setting well; summer fallowing nearly completed.

Olex, Gilliam county, Geo. W. Marvel—Cool, with light showers; crops looking much better than a week ago; hay, both rye and alfalfa, well under way; fruit prospects continue good; pasturage getting short; grain generally free from weeds; grasshoppers numerous in a few localities.

Milton, Umatilla county, F. A. Sikes—Weather ideal; gentle showers have fallen and a good crop is assured; no damage from frost; fruit generally very promising; strawberries below average; pasturage and hay excellent.

Pendleton, Umatilla county, E. W. McComas—Crop prospects continue exceptionally good; showers Wednesday and Thursday came at an opportune time; there can be but little serious damage to the crops from now on except from hail or high winds; harvest will commence about July 1st and be general by the 15th.

RAIN IS WELCOMED.

Lewiston Farmers Expect the Bumper Wheat Crop This Year.

A decline of three cents on wheat and five cents on barley is the market quotation for yesterday. Dealers report the coast markets entirely inactive and exporters are entirely out of the market, says the Lewiston Tribune.

The continued rain of yesterday was welcomed by the farmers in all of the lower country, and it is believed that a bumper crop is now assured for the Lewiston country. The upper prairie sections will also be largely benefited by the rains and the farmers generally are confident of a large yield.

Fruitgrowers state that the rain is very unfavorable for the ripening crop, but later varieties will be benefited.
