HIS NAME IS FORGOTTEN. Man Who Started Apple Culture in West Was a Vagabond. The history of the apple in the United States is almost contemporaneous with the settlement of the country. It is definitely known that the first apple trees planted in America were imported by the Dutch settlement at New York in 1614. Apple trees were also known to have been growing at Jamestown, Va., as early as 1622. Until within the last half century apples were grown almost solely for cider making, as is the case today in France. As hard cider will produce drunkenness and a horrible katzenjammer, William Penn advised his colonists in Pennsylvania to cultivate indigenous fruits alone, as apples were then used almost exclusively for making cider or applejack. Many of the orchards of the pioneers of the middle west were grown from seeds obtained in a peculiar way. Some man whose name has been forgotten, and who is remembered only by his appellation of "Apple-Seed Johnny," traveled through the west and scattered among the settlers untold quantities of apple seeds. He gave them away free of charge and he was given a hearty welcome at every cabin door. The last decade or two has shown wonderful development of the large commercial apple orchards in the west and the industry has now assumed vast proportions. Apples, for instance, are exported to England and many foreign countries. Apples cores from the big drying establishments are purchased by France to be used in the adulteration of wine and champagne. A large part of this champagne is shipped back to America in wine casks made at Poplar Bluff, Mo., in the largest barrel factory in the world. World's Fair Rates. The O. R. & N.
